It is stated that twenty thousand people in Arkansas, and fifteen thousand in Mississippi have been reduced to destitution by the recent floods in the Mississippi valley.

The sale of lands in the C. P. R. land office for the last week has averaged 20,000 acres per day. The office is crowded every day with potential applicants.—Hampshire Paper.

THIRTEEN mails left Cape Traverse for Cape Tormentine at 11 o'clock to-day. A heavy gale was blowing at the time, and no passengers were taken. There will be no mail from Cape Tormentine to-day.

THE man so seriously injured on board the steamer "Carroll," at Halifax, on Tuesday last, was Edward Hughes, of this city. His family here have received a telegram to the effect that he is improving as much as possible under the circumstances.

THE meeting to consider the report of the committee on the subject of winter communication with the mainland, will be held in the Market Hall, this evening, at 7 o'clock. As the matter for consideration is of the greatest importance, we hope to see a large attendance of citizens.

ANOTHER prehistoric canoe has been discovered in the old bed of the Rhine, in France. It is about 33 feet long, three feet wide and two feet deep. It was excavated from an oak log, which was left in its original form with the exception of its ends, which were beveled so as to give a sharp prow and stern.

THE Census Bureau of the United States reports 120,000 Mormons in Utah, 49,000 of whom are over twenty-one years old, and 40,000 less than nine years old. There are a little over 14,000 Gentiles, and there are 7,000 apostate Mormons, 800 Josephites, and 1,700 doubtful. Thirty-seven thousand of the Mormons are of foreign birth.

A FIREMAN'S ELEVATOR has been invented by F. W. Hales, Esq. It is constructed on four wheels, and so ingeniously formed that, by turning a crank on one side, it can be raised, with hose and pipe, to the level of any fire. With it the firemen will be enabled to operate successfully when a fire is burning in the upper story, or any place it cannot be reached from the street. We call the attention of the Chief Engineer to the invention, and hope to see it introduced in this and other cities, as it will be a very useful appliance.

THE storm of Thursday was severe along the railway line. The train which left Charlottetown at 8:15 a. m., yesterday, is now between County Line and Freetown. Letter from Dr. Jenkins.

To the Editor of the Examiner.

SIR,—To assail the character of another in the public press under an assumed name, even with truth, is not the act of a man or a gentleman; but he who makes such an attack with false statements and low insinuations must be an unmitigated cur; such a one, were he in Ireland, would be a fit companion for those pusillanimous wretches who, from behind the shelter of a hedge or wall, pour a volley of slugs into those against whom they have a grudge.

I have no intention of replying to the feeble attack contained in your issue of yesterday by a person assumed, no doubt very justly, of his name—it would do him too much honor.

My object in addressing you is to remove an impression that may, not unnaturally, have taken hold of the public mind as to my motives in writing upon the Lunatic Asylum. Doubtless, many persons suppose that I act with the view of obtaining for myself the position of Medical Superintendent. Had such been the case who can cavil at it. In mental capacity and professional acquirements I certainly cannot acknowledge myself the inferior of the present occupant. In experience of my profession, and as a native of the Island, having dwelt all my life among its people, having some stake in the country, and interest in its prosperity, my claims might be deemed superior to those of a young man whose chief merit, as I said before, consisted in his being unknown and coming from abroad. This I will venture to assert, that if I or any other medical man of standing in Charlottetown, had "exercised a thoroughgoing by driving out to the Asylum once a day," there would not have been the existing disgraceful record of the last twelve months.

But, sir, I have no intention of seeking the post. I care not who gets it, so that he is a man of energy and ability, who will devote to the duties of his office a share of his time in fair proportion to the amount of remuneration he receives, which is far from being the case at present.

I have written on this subject because I consider any member of the community who is aware of an imposition on the public is much to blame if he does not make it known, and I maintain that never was there a more glaring imposition on the taxpayers of this, or any other country, than that two visits a day to the wards of the Asylum should cost the public between two and three thousand dollars a year. To expose this was my object, and to show that the unparalleled outrage on, and the criminal neglect of, Mr. George Manson, were due to the supineness, lack of energy, and want of attention to the duty of disciplining and instructing his ignorant and inexperienced assistants, on the part of the Superintendent; and I will maintain that in an institution under anything like proper discipline such an occurrence would have been impossible.

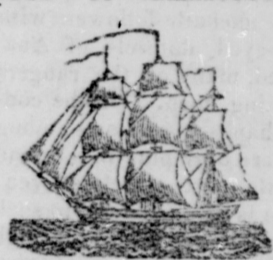
