

Council Sets Scale Of Charges For Grass, Out-Of-Town Fire Calls

A scale of charges for the attendance of any part of the Summerside fire department at grass fires, and at general out-of-town fires, was one of resolutions approved by the Summerside town Council last evening.

As a result of the fire department receiving numerous calls to attend grass fires in the town and fringe areas, a fee of \$2 per hour within the town limits, and for grass fires within the fringe areas of the town the charge was set at \$5 for the first hour, plus \$2 per hour thereafter.

For general out-of-town fires, and in the fringe areas the charge will be \$25.

A board of appeal for real estate, personal property, educational poll tax, and motor vehicles was appointed by the council, which named Neil MacLeod as chairman, and Clarence J. Steele, and J.B. Conell, as other members of the appeal board.

BUILDING PERMITS

Building permits were approved for the erection of a new Glad Tidings Chapel situated on Arcona Street to be built on a lot of land 60 by 95 feet. The building will be 30 by 50 feet, covered

with fire proof shingles, and its construction value was listed at approximately \$10,000.

A second building permit was granted to Kenneth C. Henderson for the addition of one storey "L" to his existing home on Cambridge Street.

With a view to summer activities in Summerside John Carroll was appointed sports supervisor for Little League baseball and other minor sports for a 12-week period.

The appointments of playground supervisors were also made by the council. Allan Gallant was appointed caretaker and supervisor of the west end playground; Miss Nancy Coffin was named supervisor of Queen Elizabeth Park, and the application of Miss Mary Woodside was accepted as supervisor of the east end playground.

Mayor W.A. Currie was authorized to attend the 1958 convention of the Canadian Federation of Mayors and Municipalities at North Bay, Ontario.

DEPARTMENT GRANT

A grant of \$750 was made by the council to the tournament committee of the Summerside fire department to help defray expenses in connection with the Maritime Firemen's Tournament to be held in Summerside during Lobster Carnival week.

On a resolution from the street committee for the purchase of a vehicle for the use of the street foreman for better supervision of his departments work, the council approved the purchase of a 1957 half-ton Chev truck from MacNeill Motors Ltd. at a cost of \$1375, this being the net price after a trade in allowance for a 1951 half-ton truck.

Permission was also given by the council to the RCAF Association to hold tag days on Friday and Saturday, May 22nd, and 23rd.

Correspondence dealt with by the council included the request for water and sewerage extensions to the Summerlea Restaurant area at Summerside East, and the letter bore the signature of several residents and other business firms in that area.

An additional \$475,000 to this year's tax roll was estimated from the assessment work already completed, with the entire assessment in all three wards nearing completion.

The announcement of intention to recommend the purchase of a diesel generating unit for delivery to the Summerside Electric plant early in 1958 was made by councillor W. E. MacCausland, chairman of the electric light committee.

Island Ayrshire Is Tops In Canada

Cloverdale Alberta, an Ayrshire cow owned by W. A. Moase and Sons, Kensington was the leading senior three-year-old producer in Canada in the month of April according to official ROP tests released recently by the Ayrshire Breeders' Association of Canada.

She produced 14,523 lbs. milk, 609 lbs. fat, 4.19 per cent in 305 days which is 188 percent of B.C.A. for milk and 190 percent for fat. Her milk yield ranks tenth among the All-Time All-Canadian leaders for this class and her fat yield ranks eighth. She is type classified Good Plus and her sire is Charlottetown We'll See.

Long Hill Benefactor Kit owned by J.A. MacLeod and Sons, Dundas, P.E.I., was the high milk producer in the junior 3 year old class. She yielded 13,577 lbs. milk, 527 lbs. fat in 305 days. Her milk yield ranks tenth among the All-Time All-Canadian producers. Her sire is Fairvue Benefactor.

NEW RECORD

Hammond Class Maid owned by Bowaters Newfoundland Pulp and Paper Mills Ltd., Corner Brook has established a new All-Time All-Canadian milk record for senior 3 year olds.

She produced 17,117 lbs. of milk 724 lbs. fat, 4.23 per cent in 365 days on 2X milkings to set the new record.

The previous Canadian record holder was Gengarry Betty Ann, owned by Stansell Brothers, Aylmer, Ontario, who produced 17,018 lbs. milk, 764 lbs. fat, 4.49 percent. The fat yield of Hammond's Class Maid ranks fourth among the All-Time All-Canadian producers.

In the first 305 days of this

Isolation Hammond's Class Maid produced 15,647 lbs. milk, 662 lbs. fat, 4.23 percent and these yields rank third for milk and fifth for fat among the All-Time All-Canadian producers in the 305 day division. In her first two lactations Hammond's Class Maid has produced 29,322 lbs. milk, 1,225 lbs. fat, 4.18 percent. She has been type classified Good Plus as a first calver.

TOP BREEDING N

Hammond Class Maid was bred to be a top producer. Her sire Hammond Classic is the sire of many noted Canadian producers, including Hammond's Class Primrose 2nd, the All-Time All-Canadian junior 2 year old fat producer. His 39 tested daughters have 97 records that average 11,137-M; 458-F; 4.11 percent in 304 days. B.C.A.: 134-M; 134-F.

The dam of Hammond's Class Maid is Hammond's Prize Maid, a daughter of Townhead Enterprise (Imp.) who along with Hammond's Classic was used extensively in establishing the high producing herd at Hammond's Farm. Hammond's Prize Maid has a junior 2 year old record of 13,065 lbs. milk, 506 lbs. fat, 3.87 per cent in 305 days.
