MRS. WILLIAM A. BERNARD —At the Prince County Hospital in the early hours of Thursday morning, February 1st, there passed away Mrs. William A. Bernard at the age of 73 years. Although in failing health for some time and confined to the hospital for two months, she was never known to murmur or complain amid her many days of suffering and weariness, through which she was nursed with loving care and everything possible done for her.

The deceased, the daughter of the late Mr. Joseph Morrison and Mrs. Christy MacKinnon Morrison, was born in Graham's Road, where she lived until her marriage fifty years ago, after which she moved to French River.

"Maggie" as she was familiarly known, was held in the highest esteem by all who knew her. Kind and unselfish, she has left her family a heritage that the world cannot give, nor take away. She will be greatly missed in the community where her many deeds of kindness in times of trouble and sickness will never be forgotten. IN MEMORIAM

JAMES EDWIN McCABE —The recent death of James Edwin McCabe at St. John, N. B. was learned with deep sorrow by friends and neighbours of Kinkora and vicinity.

The deceased resided in St. John for the past 12 years, and was employed by the C. N. R. at the time of his death. Born in Newton, N. B., a son of the late Mr. and Mrs. William McCabe, the earlier years of his life were spent on the home-stead, but after the death of his mother in 1919, he moved to the United States where he met and later married Miss Catherine Donaghy.

There are left to cherish his memory his widow and two sisters, Mrs. Russell Callaghan and Mrs. Emmett McNeill. One son Billy, six years old, was killed in Boston, while crossing the street on an errand for his mother.

The late Mr. McCabe, being an extensive reader, was thoroughly posted on the times and could converse on any subject social or political.

His remains accompanied by his widow and nephew Lorne McNeill arrived at Kinkora Wednesday evening, February 7th and were conveyed to the Monaghan Funeral Home, from where the funeral took place, the following morning at 9 o'clock to St. Malachy's Church, Kinkora, where Requiem High Mass was offered up for the repose of his soul by Rev.
