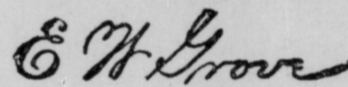
### ENGLISH PREFERENTIALISTS.

The Imperial Trade Defence and Anti-Free Imports League is endeavoring to make preferential trade an issue at the general election now going on in the United Kingdom. A pamphlet, which is being widely circulated, says:—

"Free markets have been shamefully conceded to competing goods of foreign origin, while British exports have been ruinously taxed in every port in the world, and when by the growth of her Empire England is expected to give a little preference to the products of her colonies, she is debarr'd from such a desirable course by the system inaugurated by the blatant economic hypnotism practiced by the self-sufficient peace idealists of the defunct Manchester School. . . . If the Incoming Government fails to pass measures of fiscal reconstruction, giving the wheat, lumber and fruit of Canada, the wood, wines and minerals of Australasia, the tea and rice of India, and the products of South Africa an advantage over competing goods from foreign sources, it will amount to a criminal abandonment of the best fruits of the intertrading power of the Empire."

Evidently there are people in England who feel just as strongly about preferential trade as anyone in Canada. They may not be a very large section, but they are active and growing. They represent a compact body of strong feeling which the Government will have to reckon with in the near future.—Montreal Gazette.
