United Appeal Names Budget Com. Chairman

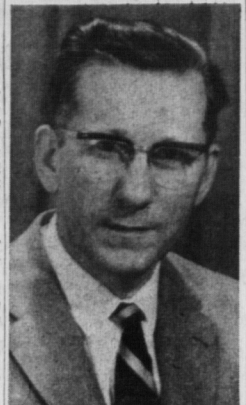

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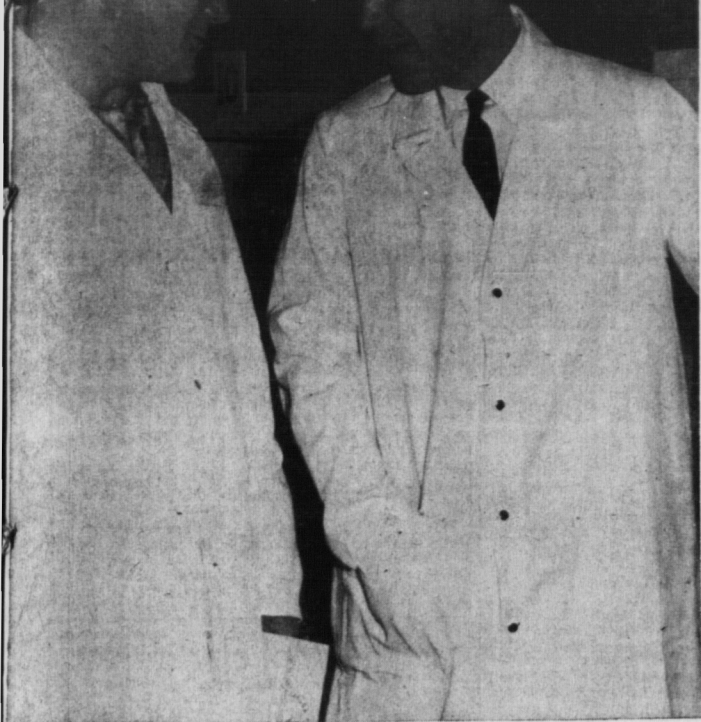
TO VISIT DE GAULLE

One of the main purposes of the visit, it was understood, will be discussions on Britain's proposed entry into the six-nation European Common Market and future political unity of the "Six."

100 HAVE SETTLED

Church Parade Slated By RCMP

Inspector A. S. McNeil, commanding officer "L" division RCMP, with headquarters at Charlottetown announced yesterday that the annual RCMP church parade will take place in Charlottetown on Sunday, May 27.

The parade will form up in Queen Square at 10.45 a.m., and the Roman Catholic party will attend 11 o'clock mass at St. Dunstan's Basilica, while the Protestant party will attend 11 o'clock service at the Kirk of St. James.

Prior to the service, the two groups will march to the cenotaph, where a tribute will be paid to those that fell in the two World Wars and the Korean conflict.

The parade will then march past the Provincial Building, on the Richmond Street side, where it is expected that Lieutenant-Governor F. Walter Hyndman will take the salute.
