Dies In Sleep Following Arrival To Preach Here

Many friends will regret to learn that Rev. J. A. Cloran, C.S.S.R., died in his sleep yesterday morning a few hours after arriving at the home of the Redemptorist Fathers here to preach a retreat for the Sisters of the Precious Blood.

A native of Montreal, where he was born in 1891, he was ordained following his graduation from the college at Esopus, N.Y., in 1916. Fr. Cloran had served here in Holy Redeemer Parish in 1934 and 1935 and was lately attached to St. Peter's Rectory in Saint John, N. B.

Funeral arrangements were not announced last night. SAINT JOHN, N.B., Feb. 17 —(CP)—The body of Rev. J. A. Cloran, who died of a heart attack today at Charlottetown, will arrive here tomorrow night and rest at St. Peter's Rectory. The High Mass of Requiem will be at 10 a. m. Thursday, with burial in Calvary Cemetery, special St. Peter's plot for Redemptorists.

Father Cloran was a member of the St. Peter's Church staff and former rector of the parish. His classical studies were with the Redemptorist Fathers of St. Anne de Beauport province at Ottawa, and he completed his seminary course at Mount St. Alphonsus Seminary, Esopus-on-the-Hudson, N.Y. An outstanding missionary, he was one of the oldest and most prominent members of Toronto province, to which St. Peter's is attached.

A rector at Edmonton before his appointment to St. Peter's, he was rector here from 1924 to 1927 at St. Patrick's, London, Ont., from 1936 to 1938. In 1945 he served as novice master for the second novitiate of the order at Woodstock, Ont., and since that year was a member of the mission band of St. Peter's.

Death Saturday Of Rev. Neil Herman

Rev. Neil Herman, retired Baptist Church clergyman, died at the Prince Edward Island Hospital Saturday after a brief illness. He became ill last Monday and went to hospital in the middle of the week.

Funeral plans were not completed last night. His wife was in New York on a visit and is now en route home and arrangements are awaiting her arrival. Mr. Herman was well known in Charlottetown and throughout the Province. He served as pastor of Central Christian Church for a time more than 20 years ago, and since then has returned briefly as supply minister. He has also preached as supply pastor in various island churches.
