THEY OUGHT TO BE REBUKED.

It will be noted that neither the Patriot nor the Pioneer has dared to call in question the correctness of the EXAMINER's statements showing that the expenditures of their "economical" Liberals have been altogether in excess of those of the men whom they are wont to call "extravagant Tories."

The Patriot complains that we are going into "ancient history." Well, it was the Pioneer which led the way by comparisons which do not affect the main question.

It will readily be seen that the Government's expenditures, year in and year out, afford the only basis of a clear and true comparison as between the two parties. If the expenditures are made, the revenue to meet them must come, or debt be incurred.

In point of fact, as we have proved to a demonstration, the Liberal Government's expenditures have been larger; their revenues have also been larger; and they have—though they solemnly promised the people to make ends meet,—heaped up a debt amounting, now, to close upon half a million of dollars.

If they could show that they have effected public improvements, these might be set off against their increase of expenditures and their increase of debt. But this they cannot do. Our schools are no better than they were—some persons say that, upon the whole, they are not so good; our roads are no better; new and improved public buildings have not been erected.

The Patriot and the Pioneer can point to nothing but columns of figures showing increases of expenditure as an excuse for the present financial condition of the Province, and these increases are due, for the most part, as every one knows, to measures taken and acts done for the purpose of strengthening the Government party.

The electors of the fourth and fifth districts of Prince County are, in duty to the country, bound to administer a stinging rebuke to the Government which has, while adding to expenditures, adding to taxes, and adding to debt, neglected the interests of the country.

—It has been remarked that the British consumer is very particular about the quality of the food he eats. In fact no other people in the whole world give so much attention to the nature and quality of the food they eat as do the great consuming classes of the Mother Country. Other producing countries recognize this fact and so must the P. E. Island producer if he wishes to obtain a profitable market for his products in Great Britain.

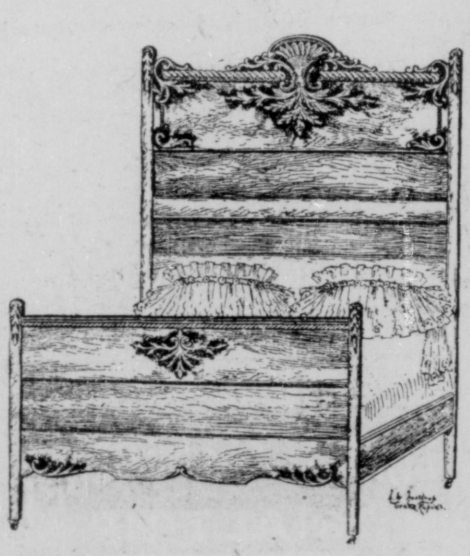

STEALING CREDIT.

The Patriot, a few days ago, took great credit for Hon. Premier Farquharson on the alleged ground that he had induced the Federal Government to send agricultural experts to this Province to lecture to our farmers. But Premier Farquharson was in this matter forestalled by the Charlottetown Board of Trade. The Board had addressed the Government and been promised that Professors Robertson and Macoun would visit Prince Edward Island before Premier Farquharson moved in the matter. It was, if we mistake not, Mr. L. L. Beer who started the idea at one of the quarterly meetings of the Board of Trade. The idea was warmly and unaimably adopted by the Board, and a correspondence with the Agricultural Department of the Government was at once opened. Let credit be given to whom credit is due. We grade Premier Farquharson credit for nothing that he may do to promote our agricultural interests. But he ought not to "come in on the freight" and claim that which is due to those who went before. So far Premier Farquharson is justly entitled only to claim that he sent Mr. Wise to England, in the hope that Mr. Wise will not kick when he comes back. We have a shrewd idea that Mr. Wise is not the man to be so cheaply bought off. If Mr. Wise should obtain information of real value to our farmers and merchants Mr. Farquharson will be able to say, with truth, "I sent him." But the credit for the visit of Professor Robertson and Professor Macoun belongs to the Charlottetown Board of Trade—not to Premier Farquharson.

—Remember the Liberal Conservative conference to be held in the Masonic Temple building tomorrow at 11 o'clock, a.m. A large delegation from the country is expected. Liberal Conservative electors in Charlottetown should make it a point to attend.

—The London Spectator, referring to Prime Minister Salisbury's position on the question, points out that the great and recognized value of the House of Lords is that it offers the opportunity for a referendum, so that the people themselves may be able to pass judgment on doubtful matters. It says:

"As in the House of Lords, the premier put with great force the referendum view of their functions—a view which has now practically become that of the constitution. The action of the House of Lords had uniformly been to delay for the judgment of the country matters on which it thought the House of Commons and the country were not agreed. That is what has been established by the practice of many years, and when our opponents wish to abolish the House of Lords the inevitable inference is that they desire to pass, before the country should have time to intervene, something upon which the House of Commons and country are not one. That was what very nearly happened. The people of this country would not part with this check on the legislature until another check that can do its work had been supplied. Most certainly they will not. England hates absolutism and monopoly, and is not going to give an absolute monopoly of power to the House of Commons."
