Cranberries Provinces to North Carolina, and inward as far west as Wisconsin. The Cape Cod area in Massachusetts has been one of the great cranberry producing areas since early colonial days.

Improved Varieties The growers in the early days of the industry used unselected, wild plants. They later selected the more productive plants, and those with large, fine berries.

Cranberry Culture The growing of cultivated cranberries has developed into one of our most complicated and intensive industries. The preparation of a cranberry bog before it can be planted, is expensive.

Cultivated Cranberries The bog cranberry is native to the acid soils of the Atlantic coast of America from the Maritime on, of Kentville, Nova Scotia.
