THE mails crossed from both Capes to-day. The mail for this city will arrive late to-night.

THE brig, *Kitty Clyde*, sailed from Baltimore, on the 1st inst., for Denzera. The report that the vessel was libeled a short time ago is not correct.

THE regular meeting of the Catholic Literary Union has been postponed until Friday evening, the 17th inst., owing to the meeting of the Benevolent Irish Society, on to-morrow evening.

THE storm last evening was very severe in the East. Most of the cuttings were filled with snow. The train from Georgetown to-day was delayed two hours and a half, and the South train for the city had only reached St. Peter's at three o'clock.

ARCHDEACON MACDONALD of the Canada Episcopal church, has a field of work on the confines of the Arctic circle, extending over about twenty degrees of longitude. About 1,500 natives have been baptised, and more than 100 are communicants.

TELEGRAPHIC NEWS.

Special Despatch to the Examiner.

OTTAWA, Feb. 8. Parliament will meet to-morrow with the usual *clat*, the return of the Governor General giving an impetus to the demonstration of the occasion.

Trains are now running daily between Winnipeg and Brandon, 145 miles. Mr. Ketchum has secured rooms in the Railway Department, in which are exhibited plans of the Chignecto Ship Railway. The scheme meets with favor among engineers.

CITY OF MEXICO, Feb. 8. Senor Romero has finally accepted the mission to Washington, and will leave next week for that city.

LONDON, Feb. 8. On the debate on the address in reply to the Queen's speech in the Commons, this afternoon, Sir Stafford Northcote assailed the Government policy. Mr. Gladstone, in an eloquent speech, vehemently attacked the Land League, and highly eulogized Mr. Forster's efforts to restore order.

The Queen, by advice of her physicians, will go to Montney in March. She will travel *incognito*.

A fire at Devonport Dockyard has destroyed oakum and oil stores, causing a damage of £20,000.

DUBLIN, Feb. 8. Dr. Kenny has been released from imprisonment.

LONDON, Feb. 8. The Earl of Lonsdale is dead.

Tobin the Fenian, was sentenced to seven years in prison.

BOMBAY, Feb. 8. The cotton crop is the largest ever recorded.

PARIS, Feb. 8. R. B. Hitchkiss, formerly of New York has been made a Knight of the Legion of Honor.

MADRID, Feb. 8. Several printers have been arrested for attempting to coerce others to join the strike recently begun. Many compositors are coming from the provinces to take the places of the strikers.

ST. PETERSBURG, Feb. 8. On account of leading editorial articles, "Golos" has received its first warning from the Government, and its retail sale is forbidden.

SACKVILLE, N. B., Feb. 8. Mr. E. W. Sewell, builder of the "Northern Light," is dead.
