## Plans First Winter Carnival

Beautiful girls, all kinds of sports, holidays from classes, and fun with a cold - season flavor - these are some of the things that go into a college winter carnival.

All these and more will be featured in the St. Dunstan's University Winter Carnival, first in the history of the institution, scheduled from Wednesday through Saturday, Jan. 30 to Feb. 2.

The carnival is the brainchild of John Dumbly, junior student at St. Dunstan's, who believes that if a winter carnival can be a success at other colleges, it can also be a success at St. Dunstan's.

A traditional torchlight parade, forming up in Charlottetown, will set off the festivities, and following this, Mayor A. Waltham Gaudet will declare the carnival officially open at a ceremony in the St. Dunstan's gymnasium Wednesday evening.

Six popular, young women will vie for the title of Carnival Queen. The judges' choice will be crowned at the carnival ball on the final night of the event. One girl was nominated by the students from each of the four college years, and the carnival queen will be crowned at a ceremony in the St. Dunstan's gymnasium Wednesday evening.

A special attraction brought here by the carnival committee will be the appearance of the Journeyman, a trio similar in style to the Kingston Trio. This group records on the Capital label. They will appear in the University Concert Hall at 8:30 p.m. on Wednesday.

EX-CASTROITE DEAD  
HAVANA (AP) — Capt. Ramon Padilla, a comrade of Fidel Castro in the early days of the Cuban premier's struggle for power, was found dead from a bullet wound Friday night in the Brazilian embassy compound. He fled to the embassy for asylum two years ago and had been living there with about 70 other refugees. Brazilian diplomats said Padilla had suffered fits of depression and expressed belief he committed suicide.
