

People "Down Under" Feel War Inevitable

The feeling of the people of New Zealand and Australia and of the delegates attending the recent conferences in Auckland, New Zealand, that world war is inevitable and imminent unless something unforeseen occurs. This was the opinion expressed on arrival in Summerside last night of Mr. J. Watson MacNaught, M. P., who had been one of the Canadian delegates to the conference and had just returned home by air.

"There was tremendous concern regarding the world situation by all the conference and there was the belief that if Korea is lost all Southeast Asia will fall to the Communists," stated Mr. MacNaught. This was particularly the feeling of the delegates from Singapore and Malaya, he added.

Although there is concern about the situation, Mr. MacNaught did not see any greater preparation in Australia and New Zealand than is in progress in this country.

"The people of Australia are urging the organization of a Pacific pact which would be to that part of the world what the Atlantic Pact is to North America and Western Europe," he stated.

One important event that occurred when Mr. MacNaught was "down under" was that the price of wool went to the startling high price of \$3 a pound in Canadian currency at the present rate of exchange.

With other members of the Canadian delegation he left Vancouver on Nov. 10 by British Commonwealth Pacific Airlines and arrived in Auckland on Sunday, Nov. 12 having lost a day en route on crossing the international date line. The conference met in Wellington and lasted five days and was productive of much understanding and good will among the members of the various nations Mr. MacNaught said.

Frank Discussions

It was featured by frank discussions and the feeling seemed to permeate all the meetings that if the Commonwealth failed there was not much future for the free world. There were 70 delegates present representing 42 parliaments. In addition to the Cana-

Electric power was restored in most of Summerside by about four p. m. on Tuesday (not Wednesday) and the roads out of Summerside to Charlottetown, Borden and Tignish were also open that same evening.

Telegraph lines out from Summerside were still out of commission yesterday morning, but there was some hope of having one line in operation to Charlottetown by last night.

Navy Will Bear Cost Of Greetings

VICTORIA, B. C., Dec. 22 —(CP) — The navy will bear the cost of sending Christmas greetings from the folks at home to sailors serving aboard the destroyers now in the Korean war theatre.

All relatives must pay is the cost of the telegram from their own home to the naval communications centre at Esquimalt. From there on, the senior service will handle it.

Other messages will take priority over the holiday greetings, so no guarantee of time of delivery can be given by the navy.

Telegrams to Esquimalt for forwarding should have the sailor's name, number and ship.
