

UPEI VOTES TO DROP OUT OF AFS

HALIFAX (CUP) - Faced with the loss of all but one member from outside Nova Scotia, the Atlantic Federation of Students decided to disband at a conference last weekend.

Notice of motion was given to dissolve the A.F.S. and to form the Nova Scotia Organization. Students of Mt. Allison, St. Thomas University, U.P.E.I., Memorial University (St. John's campus) and Acadia University recently voted against retaining

their A.F.S. membership and various members of the A.F.S. executive resigned their positions.

The only remaining member outside of Nova Scotia is Memorial University (Cornerbrook campus). Unaware of the intentions of the other institutions prior to the conference, Cornerbrook delegates expressed disappointment in the outcome of the conference.

The A.F.S. had been formed in '74-'75 as students felt the need to

organize and due to the existence of other associations within the Maritimes, they felt this could be done best on a regional level.

Most Nova Scotia delegates are looking forward to the formation of the new organization. A working committee was

established at the conference to discuss the possibilities for its structure. Views are optimistic leading into

the next conference, to be hosted by Dalhousie University on Nov. 4th.
