However, nobody was too surprised at the Juniors coming out on top. On past performances, that was definitely what was supposed to happen. Saints had looked woeful against Parkdale Royals and Navy Tars and there appeared no good reason why they'd come up with the type of game that would cause the Garrison any trouble.

BUT THE Red and Whitters apparently had learned plenty from their previous beatings and they went after those Juniors Tuesday night in a workmanlike manner. Had their shooting been more accurate, especially in the first and third periods, the Collegians could easily have won the battle. In the first period, Ivan St. Julien's tally was the only goal of the session but the Red and White gang had Ward at their mercy several times but just didn't know what to do with the rubber. Again in the third stanza, after Juniors had gone into that 5-3 lead, the Saints missed many golden opportunities to get back in the hockey game.

But the loss didn't discourage the boys from out on the road. They knew they had thrown a scare in the snappy Juniors and that from now on they'd be no walkover for any of the league entrants. This is a good thing for the league and the league certainly needs such things. That Summerside loss didn't hurt the loop one little bit and Saints' showing the very next night gave matters another boost.

There could be a whole lot of fun before the Charlottetown and District Hockey League winner is declared and we're predicting they will be.

LOOKING AHEAD to Maritime Junior playdowns, we feel the Garrison boys need to pull up their socks a bit if they don't want to be hustled right out of the playoff picture.

Now right at the start, don't get us wrong. We're not calling the local boys to be easy marks for the first mainlanders they encounter. We think if they get down to real business they'll make it plenty rough for any of them. However, there scoring punk appears to be lacking of late. Tuesday four of the five goals the Garrison got were scored other than by bonafide juniors. Merrill Pineau fired three and coach Carver got another. There's still loads of time to correct these inaccuracies around the net? This is the proper time to find out what the faults are and start to work on the remedies. If these remedies are forthcoming, then Garrison Juniors will make any Maritime Junior squaring step lively.

NEW YORK (AP) — Catcher Yogi Berra signed his 1959 contract with the world champion New York Yankees Wednesday, apparently taking a salary cut of about \$2,500.

"I'm satisfied," said Berra. "I wouldn't have signed if I wasn't." Berra was reported to have received \$50,000 in 1957, and last year it was understood he was cut to \$45,000. It was believed he signed for \$42,500 for the 1959 season.

Berra, who hit .266 in 88 games last season, said he expected to be given a tryout at first base, and perhaps right field. Elston Howard is expected to do most of the Yankee catching this year.
