QUEEN VICTORIA has sent an autograph letter to the parents of Miss Louise Journeaux, the heroine of the Jersey boating adventure, the particulars of which appeared in THE EXAMINER some time ago, congratulating them on the rescue and safety of their daughter. Her Majesty has also sent a message and a sum of money to Miss Journeaux.

A FEW days ago while an iron dealer was unloading his wagon filled with old artillery material at St. Petersburg, which had been purchased from the government at auction sale, a nine-inch shell, supposed not to have been properly unloaded, exploded among a group of workmen and children. Sixteen persons, including four children, were killed and several more were injured.

ADVICES from Toronto report that dastardly outrages are being perpetrated upon the active supporters of the Scott temperance act. At Hastings the property of several persons has been wantonly destroyed. On Tuesday a house at Arthur was burned and the stables and outbuildings of License Commissioner Graham, at Smith's Falls, were destroyed and Mr. Graham fatally burned.

THE Charlottetown Rifle Club held its fourth season competition on Saturday afternoon, at Kensington. The ranges were 200, 300 and 600 yards; seven shots at each. Capt. Weeks won the Silver Spoon with a total of 72 points. This is the second Silver Spoon that Capt. Weeks has captured in the four competitions. The Horn Spoon fell to the lot of Lieutenant H. C. McDonald.

ON Wednesday last some parties were fishing off the point near Shaw's Hotel, Brackley Point, with the hook and line, when a school of mackerel was observed. Two boats, captained by John F. Barnard and Albert Kensley, Esqs., took a haul in the fun and by aid of a seine succeeded in landing 45 lbs. choice mackerel within an hour from the time they were first observed. Next!

THE Chicago News says its knowledge of a man who was innocently telling his wife that he had been thinking of taking her out for a plate of ice cream, but the recent ice cream poisoning case in Somerville had caused him to hesitate. Upon her rejoinder that poison had lately been found in the best brands of whiskey he gave an evasive answer and went away to reflect. It is useless to reason with these men.

THE adjourned court convened at Gagetown, N. B., on Tuesday last, Judge Watters, of St. John, presiding. When the Rev. D. D. Currie's case was called, his counsel, Mr. L. A. Currie, served an order nisi for a writ of prohibition from a judge in the supreme court not to hear or proceed with the case. The judge then declined to hear it or any motion in reference thereto.

TERRENCE McATIE and three drunks occupied reserved seats at the Stipendiary Magistrate's Court this forenoon. There were two charges against the redoubtable Terrence. The first was that one night last week a sudden thirst for filthy lucre took possession of him, and almost simultaneously he took possession of a sailor who happened to be at hand, from whom he demanded the small sum of 25 cents. The sailor refused to fork over, and Terrence proceeded to compel him by giving him several blows in the mouth. Where moral suasion failed, force was successful—the sailor handed over the "quarter." While Terrence went on his way rejoicing, and the sailor "sailed" in the direction of the police station. As the sailor was not present Terrence was remanded until such time as he could be found. The other charge was one of assault:—Yesterday evening McAtie got into a row with another sailor, but this time the sailor was the victor and Terrence the vanquished. He did not take his defeat very gracefully, and determined to "get square" on his opponent. With this object in view, and a brick in his hand, he approached a young man whom he thought was his nautical opponent, and let him have the full benefit of the soft side of it in the head, inflicting a severe wound. For this offence he was remanded eight days. The three drunks were fined \$2 each.

Two hundred acres of cranberries, in the vicinity of Tomah, Wis., have been ruined by recent forest fires. The loss is estimated at \$50,000. It will take eight or ten years for the vines to grow again.

WHILE a farmer named Brown, of South Wiltshire, was engaged moulding potatoes on Thursday last, his horse took fright and ran away coming in contact with a barbed wire fence cutting himself severely.

NOTICE of a meeting of the parishoners of St. Dunstan's Cathedral, to be held in St. Patrick's Hall on Sunday evening next for the purpose of completing arrangements for the building of a new cathedral, was given yesterday at High Mass.

A NEW YORK despatch says that a sloop carrying a picnic party of between 20 or 30 residents of Manteo, N. C., was capsized in Albemarle Sound, on Wednesday, by a squall. A number of persons were drowned. The bodies of three young women and a child have been recovered.

STAFF CAPT. HERBERT, of the Gospel Army, is doing all in her power to effect the reformation of certain well known hard characters. She has been successful in several cases, and to-day, at her solicitation, an order was issued for the release from jail of a "confirmed drunkard," whom she proposes to take in hand and reform.

SAYS the St. John Sun: The Flying Yankee had a very large passenger list Friday, principally through passengers. Quite a number of the women belonged to Nova Scotia, who had gone to Boston from two to six weeks ago in search of employment, and were returning to their homes sad but wiser.

THE largest halibut probably ever landed at Port la Tour was caught by William Powell, in the neighborhood of Brazil Rock. It was with the greatest difficulty that he was secured by Mr. Powell and his boatmate. The fish weighed near 450 lbs., and was 18 inches in thickness, very fat and of excellent quality. —Halifax Herald.

THE Cape Sable Advertiser says that on Tuesday last Gilbert Bleckhorn, of Macean, after making ineffectual attempts to drive into his barn a steer which he wished to have slaughtered, determined to shorten the job by shooting him. Hastily loading an old gun, he took it from the house, but by some means was impelled to make another effort in driving in the animal before firing. Finding he could not accomplish it, he discharged the piece, which burst at the point grasped by the left hand, which was so badly shattered that a physician found it necessary to amputate it at the wrist.

A SAN FRANCISCO exchange says that a young man, giving his name as Andrew Norvinson, collected a number of dimes by turning his head around so that his chin rested on his spine between his shoulder blades. He claimed to be a native of Sweden, aged 19 years, and said that his neck was broken by a fall from the top of a barn when 6 years old, and that his life was despaired of for nearly a month. He said that his head felt as if asleep—"kind of numb"—while turned to the right, but that he could see things as well and think, but could not speak nor eat while in that position. His appearance when performing the feat is, for some unaccountable reason, somewhat shocking.

MESSRS N. LOGAN & SONS, of St. John, N. B., last week completed a handsome four-oared racing shell, to the order of Mr. John Joy, of the South End Boating Club. She is an in-riggered boat, constructed of white pine, and measures 39 feet in length, and weighs 166 pounds. The boat was shipped for here on Saturday morning. When she arrived at Point du Chevre the outriggers, owing to the improper manner in which she was stored on the car, caught in the warehouse at the Point, as a result of which the washboard and several of the sliding seats were torn out. The railway authorities sent the boat back to the Messrs. Logan to be repaired, and she will likely arrive here early next week.

THE principal streets of Montreal were lighted with the electric light for the first time on Wednesday evening last.

ON Friday evening last, Capt. Costello, schr. Annie Lewis, threw his seine several times in Souris Bay. There were plenty of mackerel schooling around, but owing to the shallowness of the wayward, B. Bremner and the seine. He succeeded, however, in capturing between 30 and 40 barrels. Capt. Costello is one of the most energetic skippers afloat. Some of the shore seiners also made fair hauls.

A party of disguised men broke open the jail and shot Hollar through the abdomen. Before Hollar died he insisted that he did not commit the foul deed. Wm. McLaughlin, who had basely deserted his wife, died recently in a Western State, confessing in his last moments that he was the author of the terrible crimes for which Hollar lost his life.

HIS LORDSHIP BISHOP McINTYRE left here this morning by the steamer St. Lawrence for Quebec, where he will be present on Monday next at the ceremony of Cardinal Taschereau's investiture. His Lordship will also visit Montreal on the 27th inst., and Ottawa on the 29th inst., the dates on which the pallia will be conferred upon Archbishopships Fabre and Duhamel. Bishop McIntyre returns home about the first of August, and will, we understand, in company with several of his clergy, visit British Columbia in September, delaying at several points along the route of the C. P. R.

A CONCERT under Mr. Earle's direction will be given in Pownall Hall this evening in aid of the Episcopal Church at Cherry Valley. Mr. Earle will be assisted by Miss Minnie Falmer, Mrs. Rooome and Miss Reddy, leading soprano of the Montreal Cathedral. Messrs. Vintoncomb, F. H. Beer, George Peake, F. O. Beer, F. Maynard, B. Bremner and others. Steamer leaves Charlottetown at 6.30. Concert at 7.30. Steamer waits for Concert performers and others who desire to attend, and will return to the city on or about 10.30 after the concert.

ALTHOUGH the late English Parliament was the shortest-lived of the century, and was pretty well occupied with the Irish question, it managed to pass the act giving women a joint guardianship with their husbands of their children, the Shop Hours' Bill, and the Sale of Drink Bill, besides repealing certain acts affecting the morals of the country. It also dealt with the question of medical education, amended the law of copyright, provided some redress for the crofters, and brought under discussion the question of titles, thereby taking the first step to a much-needed reform.

CAPT. McELHINNEY, of the Marine Department, has been sent to New York to examine a four-hundred ton steam cutter, which is said to be offered for sale at a bargain, and which the Dominion authorities desire to purchase for the fisheries protection service. Should Capt. McElhinney report the vessel suitable for the service, she will be purchased at once, and taken to Halifax to be fitted out. The present fleet is reported to be totally insufficient to protect the fisheries from American vessels. The fisheries department are constantly receiving telegrams from various points on the coasts of Cape Breton and Prince Edward Island, reporting American vessels taking fish within the three-mile limit.

A CORRESPONDENT writes:—"The Lansdowne called again at Souris on the 14th, and after finding the coast in that vicinity clear of poachers, steamed away in the direction of East Point and North Side. Capt. Scott, R. N., means business, and is fully determined to guard our fisheries from foreign greed and selfishness. American skippers must certainly know by this time that the Treaty of 1818 will be maintained in its entirety as long as their Government continues to shut us out of their markets. Both the Imperial and the Canadian Governments have resolved upon this, and no amount of bluster from Portland or Gloucester will deter them from carrying their intentions into effect. American skippers should not allow themselves to be deceived by false reports circulated by Grit newspapers. Repairs, shelter, wood and water are all that they can count on at present. Only that and nothing more."
