Mavor Moore To Remain Here

Frank Storey, general manager, is commenting on a report from Toronto that Mavor Moore would accept the position of artistic director of the proposed St. Lawrence Centre for arts in that city, said yesterday. Mr. Moore will be connected with Confederation Centre "at least for the foreseeable future."

Mr. Storey stated this report was probably true as he had known Mr. Moore was negotiating with other interests. However, just before leaving recently for Toronto, Mr. Moore had assured him that he would be in Charlottetown not only this year, but in 1966 as well and all Centre planning for next year has been based on that assurance.

Earlier this year the artistic director of the Centre had leased for five years production rights to his widely known Spring Thaw revue which showed here for the first time in 1964 and is currently appearing in its 1965 edition at the Memorial Theatre.

Mavor Moore has been a popular figure in this city since the first came to Charlottetown and has had almost fantastic success with the productions he has brought to the new theatre.

Known all over the theatrical world for his fabulous career due largely to his ability to switch from highly successful producing to equally successful writing, or from acting to directing, his show world contacts have been invaluable in enabling him to bring to Charlottetown some of the leading figures in the Canadian theatre.

Sculptor Dies At 91

EDINBURGH, Scotland (CP)—Herbert Maryon, well-known British sculptor and expert on ancient and modern metal work died July 14 at the age of 91. He was cremated here last Saturday.

A one-time master of sculpture at the University of Durham, Newcastle, Maryon spent the autumn of his years on serving ancient relics at the British Museum.

He was considered an outstanding craftsman and received the Order of the British Empire in 1956 for his work in preserving jewels and other precious works, the products of an early Anglo-Saxon age found in a buried ship in 1929.

He wrote a number of books on sculpturing and archaeology. He was traveller, visiting both Canada and the United States. Maryon is survived by three children, including John, a consulting engineer in Toronto.

George W. Cheverie, manager of the Charlottetown office of the National Employment Services announced that the Unemployment Insurance section will close at 4 p.m. but the National Employment service will remain open until 5 p.m. daily, Monday through Friday.

In past years the National Employment and Unemployment Insurance offices across the country have been closed at 4 p.m. during the summer months.

This was to compensate the staff for their earlier starting hours during the rest of the year; and the hours of duty worked, particularly during the winter months, when the workload was heavier with many people filing claims for benefit.

The NES is providing a service to both employer and employee, and should, Mr. Cheverie said, adhere to the normal hours of service throughout the year.

Drunken Driving Case Adjourned

Donald Stewart Waddell of Charlottetown, charged with drunken driving, was remanded to July 27 for trial when he appeared before Magistrate A. James Haslam, QC, in city police court Tuesday morning.

The accused, represented by John Holmes, previously pleaded not guilty to the charge.

The case of Thomas Willi a m Johnston of Charlottetown, charged with driving with passengers in an unsafe position, was dismissed for want of prosecution.

Johnston, a sports car driver, told the court that he was proceeding to Southport with two passengers sitting on the rear portion of his vehicle when stopped by the RCMP who gave him a ticket to appear in court.

The Crown had no witnesses and the case was dismissed. Two persons, charged with being drunk and incapable, were lodged in jail on previously suspended commitments.

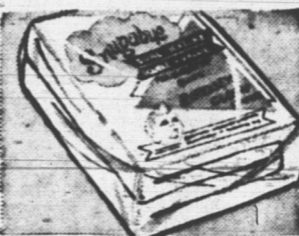


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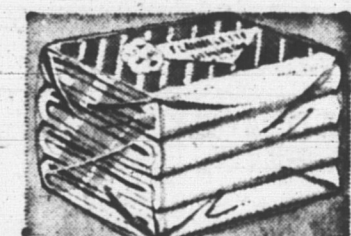
