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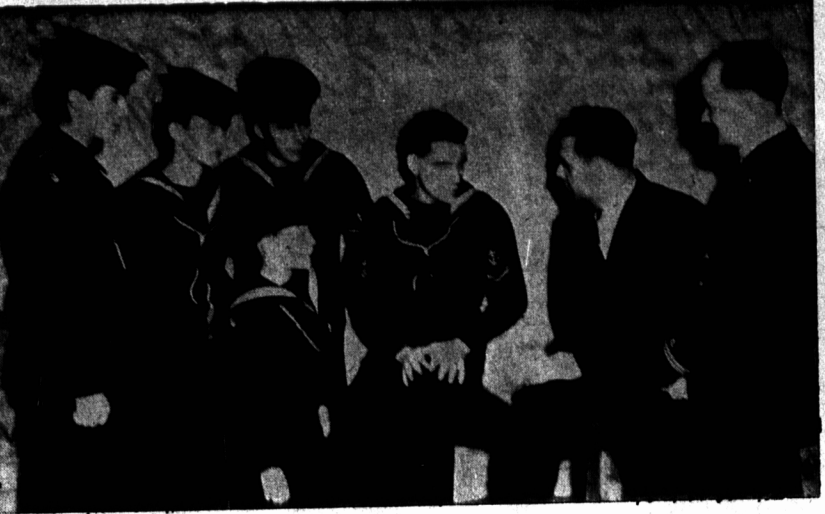
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Congratulations To Potato King

Veteran Doctor Dies In B. C.

The death occurred suddenly in Kootenay Lake General Hospital, on November 26th, a former Prince Edward Islander, Dr. Frederick Auld 78, of Nelson, B. C.
Dr. Auld had completed almost a half century of medical practice, and was a senior member of the Canadian Medical Association. This honour was bestowed upon him at the annual convention held in Halifax in 1950. He served as president of the B. C. College of Physicians and Surgeons; the Council of Physicians and Surgeons, B. C. and the B. C. Medical Association. He was an honorary life member of both the Canadian Medical Association, and the B. C. association, acting on many committees.
In early life, he spent many years as a medical missionary in the far east, and was largely instrumental in the drive to have a 100 bed hospital built in Honan province, China.
BORN AT COVEHEAD
Dr. Auld was born on a farm at Covehead, P. E. I., and was educated in the rural school and at Prince of Wales College. After five years in the teaching profession, he entered McGill University and there attained his Arts and Medical degrees in 1909.
In 1910 he married Miss May Smith of Montreal, and the same year he departed for the Orient. During World War I he served with the Royal Army Medical Corps in France, and at the end of hostilities returned to missionary work in China and Korea. In Nelson, B. C. Dr. Auld was district coronor from 1941, and he also held the positions of city health officer and provincial jail surgeon, resigning last spring. He was a member of Nelson Rotary Club and an elder of St. Paul's United Church.
Besides his wife, he is survived by one son, Dr. Bert Auld, Vancouver; one daughter Lillian at home; three brothers, Dr. Hedley Auld, Regina; Sterling, Regina, and Robert, Freetown, P. E. I.; one sister, Mrs. David Dix, Saskatoon. He was predeceased by two sons, David and Reginald, in China.

Art Society Hears Talk By Mr. G. Raja Gopal

Mr. G. Raja Gopal spoke on Art to a number of members of the Prince Edward Island Art Society and guests Tuesday evening at the Art Society Club room.
"Modern Art cannot be brushed aside as being meaningless. There must be something behind it," he went on to point out that modern Art is a "symptom of revolt against the mechanical age in which we live. We have gotten away from the basic truths of primitive men who produced art more modern than modern Art."
He said "the fundamental reason for the expressionist Art is the urge to create beauty—to imitate nature—God—to express a deep feeling of holiness always present in man."
"If artists appear to break convention, they are not really," he said, "they are merely obeying the morality of God rather than of man."
"The artist is a man of deep insight and understanding. He discards values out of life. The more insight he has, the more and higher values he extracts. The utopia of society would be one in which society follows the artist. Primitive man is not inferior to modern man, human nature is always the same."
"Primitive art is world wide and archaeologists are discovering to us Primitive Art had an innate spirit of freedom which modern man has lost," said the speaker.
"In the East Art is not laughed at scoffed or condemned. Pure wisdom will follow when people begin to realize that the living tradition of freedom of artists leads to understanding and unity."
Mr. Gopal made a plea for insight and understanding among peoples of the world. "Let us look for links," he said, "rather than differences."
