### TO THE RESCUE.

Sir Richard Puts His Foot Down

EXTRAVAGANT SCHEMES NIPPED.

Sir Louis and Mr. Mills on the Right Side.

TORONTO, Jan. 8.—The Mail and Empire's Ottawa special says: "It is learned that Sir Richard Cartwright, as a result of pressure which has been brought to bear on him by his liberal friends in Ontario since last session to exert his influence in correcting the extravagant tendencies of the government, has presented an ultimatum to his colleagues since the government reassembled.

The exact nature of the ultimatum the despatch adds, has not been divulged; but it is supposed that the liberal financier has given the government to understand that the affairs of the country can be administered on a more economical scale.

Sir Richard has put his foot down upon the acquisition of the Canada Eastern Railway by the government and subsidizing another line between Montreal and Quebec.

He is unalterably opposed to the new schemes involving a large expenditure to which several of his colleagues wish to commit the government. In this attitude he has the support and co-operation of Sir Louis Davies and Mr. Mills.

A. R. Notman, at present C. P. R. District Passenger Agent at St. John, has been appointed General Passenger Agent of the line in New Brunswick and Maine.

### THE CHINESE PROBLEM.

England and Japan in Concert

RUSSIA'S LOAN PROPOSAL REJECTED.

China Will get the Money in England.

LONDON, Jan. 8.—A despatch from Shanghai says: A Japanese fleet of three battleships, ten cruisers and numerous smaller vessels has been placed at the disposal of Sir Alex. Buller, Commander-in-Chief on the China station. This step has been taken in case Russia persists in ignoring the joint interest of England and Japan.

PEKING, Jan. 8.—China has rejected the proposals for a Russian guarantee loan. Kiao Chou has been leased to Germany for fifty years only, although Germany has demanded a ninety-nine year term.

LONDON, Jan. 8.—The Standard says: It is now rumored that Great Britain will loan China £16,000,000 direct without the issue of a private guarantee loan.

### PENITENTIARY OFFICIALS.

Rumored Changes.

DORCHESTER, Jan. 8.—It is rumored here that four guards of the penitentiary are to be discharged; that Deputy Warden Ross is to be removed, and that Warden Foster will be transferred from here to St. Vincent De Paul Penitentiary, and that Accountant Gray will be temporarily transferred from here to St. Vincent De Paul.

## THE CUBAN REBELLION.

Steps Towards Conciliation.

Conferences to be Held.

HAVANA, Jan. 8.—It is rumored that General Fitz-Hugh Lee will accompany Capt. General Blanco when the latter takes the field. It is further reported that Senor Estrada Palma, delegate to the United States of the Cuban Insurgents, will arrive here shortly and accompany the Captain-General and General Fitz-Hugh Lee to the field, and that conferences with General Gomez will follow. The reports have caused a sensation.

## THE RECIPROCAL CLAUSE.

Additional Countries Enjoying the Benefit.

OTTAWA, Jan. 8.—Several more countries have been added to the list of those entitled to the benefits of the Canadian Reciprocal Tariff. They are Morocco, Siberia, Salvador, Tonga and the South African Republic. The concession is made not on the merits of the tariffs of these countries, but on account of Britain's treaty obligations.

LATEST NEWS BY WIRE AND MAIL

NEW YORK, Jan. 6.—At the Presbyterian hospital, today, Mrs. Mand Ballington Booth was said to be slowly improving. She must remain in the hospital some time, however.

MONTREAL, Jan. 6.—J. H. Blumenthal & Sons, one of the largest clothing houses in the city, assigned yesterday to Gault Bros. The firm had three large stores in the city. The liabilities will be very heavy, amounting to about \$150,000.

OTTAWA, January 6.—Although the militia authorities have heard nothing from the Imperial Government concerning the latter's alleged intention to employ a regiment of Canadian soldiers in case of war in the East, applications for leave to volunteer for such active service are pouring in from all parts of Canada.

WASHINGTON, Jan. 6.—The navy department has received a report from the naval attaché at London, England, telling of the ceremony attending the laying of the first plates for the Queen's new yacht, to replace the antiquated Victoria and Albert, which has carried royalty for many years. The new yacht is to cost \$1,000,000. The new vessel will be the same length as the cruiser New York, 580 feet over all. She will have a speed of 21 knots. Only two guns will be in her battery and these are intended principally for saluting purposes.

LONDON, Jan. 6.—According to a special despatch from Shanghai, Russia is endeavoring to obtain terms similar to Germany's for the occupation of Port Arthur and the Liao Tung peninsula from a point considerably south of Ta-Lien-Wan. It is believed that the attitude of England and Japan will frustrate her designs.

VANCOUVER, B. C., Jan. 5.—About three months ago, E. Galloway, of this city, sent some homing pigeons to the Klondike. Yesterday one of the birds arrived home. A message had been attached to its leg by a brass ring. The ring was still attached to the leg, but the message was gone. The bird was very much the worse for wear, but has the distinction of making the first trip from the Klondike by the air route. Galloway expects two more birds to arrive daily.

PARIS, Jan. 6.—Another letter from an officer of the Marchand expedition (now understood to be marching northward along the Nile) indicated that the report of the massacre of 20 Senegalese riflemen and an officer, M. Paul Compe, belonging to the expedition, by natives on the River Ubanghi, who were subsequently punished by a French armed steamer.

VIENNA, Jan. 7.—The Deutsche Zeitung, echoing the German feeling, says: England has suffered a crushing defeat, but there is no fear of war. The British lion roars, but he does not bite. All civilized nations ought to be grateful to Emperor William for having destroyed the myth of Great Britain's universal domination.
