

# Ring Reminiscences

— Fights and Fighters —

Pat and I had gone the distance quite easily from the summit to Whitehorse. It was a slight down grade all the way. There were roadhouses and eating places at regular intervals for the entire distance, also N. W. M. P. posts. I remember that "lamb curry and rice" was a ubiquitous item of the menu cards at that time in those rather primitive places. The "hash slingers" were generally half-breed Indian women who named the different items on the bill of fare.

Evidently there was quite a number of Indians around the headwaters of the Yukon and in fact scattered places for the whole length of the Yukon river system, 1979 miles from its remotest source in the McKenzie range of mountains quite near the Pacific coast, to its mouth near Nome and the Behring Sea. It drains an area of 320,000 sq. miles of which 127,000 sq. miles are Canadian territory.

It is navigable for steamboats (river boats) from Nome to Whitehorse, a distance of approximately 1,700 miles. This is the longest navigable stretch of inland water on the North American continent; with the possible exception of the Mississippi in conjunction with its tributaries, the Ohio and Missouri. The physical scenery on the Yukon is rugged and magnificent. The river, above Whitehorse drains a system of lakes on the high lands of British Columbia and Yukon territory.

Atlin Lake, the principal source, is about 40 or 50 miles long, and has several steam boats plying on its waters also what is reputed to be the shortest railway in the world (1 1/2 miles) across a portage from one lake to another. The parts of the whole ensemble were taken in on sleds and mule back (it was built before the days of aeroplanes) and put together by some former railway mechanic who was on the spot, and promoted the enterprise and was the principal factor in putting it into successful operation.

The other lakes are Teslin lake and Tagish lake, also Lake Lundermann near Whitehorse. Sometimes lakes are the source of rivers in the mountainous country, sometimes glaciers are the sources.

Generally lakes are expansions of rivers, deep flat depressions where rivers widen and current is reduced to almost nothing. These lakes are the Mecca of the famous lake trout which seem to be a sort of "freak" species — many times the size of rainbow trout and greyling, and not so large as salmon. They are palatable and contain plenty nutritious aliment. The largest I've heard of was 35 lbs. The record salmon was caught at Brown's Bay, Vancouver Island two years ago, weighing 71 lbs.

The greyling is a game fish which looks much like trout, except that it is of a grey color. Greyling go up small creeks and streams in the fall, presumably to spawn. Indians and white prospectors trap them by placing a frame of small peeled poles across the stream in a shallow place where there is a good grade. The upper end of the frame is made fast in the gravel of the stream bed, and the lower end extends above the water of the stream.

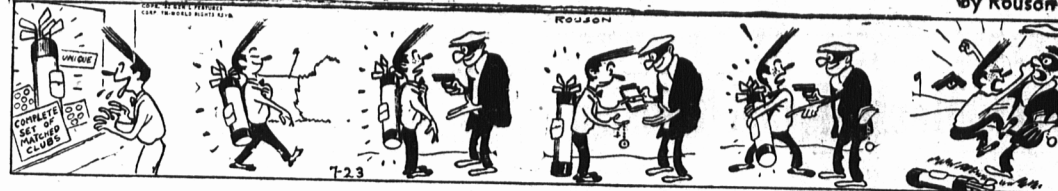
When the fish come down stream they are pushed onto the dry part of the poles and stay there, they soon freeze solid and are picked up later by the trapper whose supply will remain frozen till spring if he chooses.

Once winter sets in there is no thaw till summer comes again. Spring and fall seasons as we experience them in the East are a very negligible quantity in the Yukon territory. The change from summer to winter and vice versa is quite abrupt.

The resourcefulness of those Indians and whites who virtually "live off the land" is astonishing. Of course the Indians had lived in the rigorous climate and bleak inhospitable expanse of rock, forest and stream perhaps for centuries. They had learned all the arts of wrestling a living from the wilderness. They had no written or hieroglyphic history — not even the totem poles like the coast Indians.

The hoary old seer, Chief Isaac at Moosehide Indian village two miles below Dawson, told the whites

## Russia Takes Over Team Lead At Olympic Games

HELSINKI, July 22 (CP)—Marjorie Jackson, 21-year-old typist from Australia, flashed to a brilliant victory today in the women's 100-metre Olympic championship—the only championship in four not gobbled up by the powerful, record-smashing United States track and field contingent.

Brown-haired Marjorie equalled both the world and Olympic records in five seconds, and behind her flying heels came three other Brit's Commonwealth girls.

Outside of that, the gold-medal honors on this third day of sensational performances belonged strictly to the United States.

Rev. Bob Richards, pole-vaulter parson from California, smashed the Olympic pole-vault record, clearing a 14.5 metres. The United States 240-pound Calliforman broke the record for the discus throw.

Mal Whitfield, smooth-running Ohioan, tied his own record in winning the 800-metre run. One other record disappeared today. Herbert Schade of Germany, winning a trial heat of the 5,000-metre run, erased the old marked list in three days of competition at the big Olympic Stadium, nine Olympic records have been broken. The United States has won eight of 12 events.

But Russia still leads the unofficial point standing, amassing 92 1/2 points last night in gymnastics and now in the lead with a total of 136 1/2. The United States, scoring heavily in track and field, has brought its total to 115.

**Canada Without Point**  
Canada is still without a point. Roy Pella of Sudbury, Ont., got past the qualification round in the discus event and finished 14th. Ritchie Ferguson of Toronto had to drop out of the 5,000-metre race when his "legs just went dead."

Three Canadians were eliminated from the 200-metre sprint event in today's preliminary heats. Don McFarlane of Hamilton and Bob Hutchison of Victoria got past the first heat but were eliminated in the second. Pete Sutton of Toronto was eliminated in the first.

Marjorie Jackson equalled the 100-metre record marks twice in becoming the new spring champion, finishing in 11.5 seconds in

Virgil Trucks gave up just one hit, a single, by Eddie Yost, in hurling the last-place Detroit Tigers to a 1-0 American League victory over Washington Senators Tuesday night.

Yost, a hit-spilling single came on Truck's first pitch of the game. After that the 33-year-old righthander, who on May 15 defeated the same team on a no-hit by the same 1-0 score, cut the Washington batsmen down in methodical fashion. He gave only three bases on balls.

Brooklyn Dodgers roared back with five runs in the last of the 10th inning, after Cincinnati Reds had tallied four in the top of the inning, to eke out a 7-6 National League victory. Ken Raffensberger, third Redleg pitcher of the inning, hit Rube Walker with a pitched ball to force in the winning run.

It was Brooklyn's ninth straight triumph and enabled the Dodgers to maintain their 7 1/2 game bulge over New York Giants, who

downed St. Louis Cardinals 3-2. Hank Thompson smashed his 13th home run with a man on base in the sixth inning to give the Giants their victory. Rookie Jim Rhodes, making his Poli Grounds debut, cracked a home run in his first time at bat to account for the first Giant run. Dave Koslo went the distance for the Giants.

Kar Drews, who became a father for the third time Tuesday racked up his seventh win of the season as Philadelphia Phillies trounced Pittsburgh Pirates 8-1 in the nightcap game of a twin bill, after the Phillies won the opener 14-4 in a wild batting spree. In the hard-hitting first game, Philadelphia scored 11 of their tallies in the first three innings off Rookie Calvin Hogue. The double win put the Phillies within one game of fourth place in the National League.
