



DOWN THE BACK STRETCH

We have been so busy following the Maritime race circuit that we have not paid as much attention perhaps as we should, to doings elsewhere. At Foxboro, Mass. recently, Globe Trotter, owned by Harry Hirsch was 3rd in the C Pace stepped in 2:10 4/5 and Clara Clegg was 2nd in the 2:24 Pace, Kay Rudlong 4th in 2:14 4/5. The trotter Annie Scott, owned by Harry Hirsch, was 2nd in the CC Trot in 2:11 2/5 and Super Hal, owned by Harry Hirsch, was 2nd in the BB and A Pace, time, 2:06 2/5. Colonel Dan was 4th in the same event. Colonel Clegg was 3rd in the 2:23 pace and Lee Budlong 4th, E. J. Clegg 5th in 2:14 1/5. Mary S. Budlong, a 4-year-old by Calumet Budlong, won the 2:24 pace in 2:13 3/5 and June Bee, driven by Rannie MacDonald, won the 2:22 pace in 2:10 1/5. Globe Trotter (Mauger) was 4th in the 2:23 pace, purse \$1,500, time, 2:09, and Rannie MacDonald won the C Trot with Great Doon in 2:15. The final summary showed Annie Scott (Mauger) winning the CC Trot, purse \$600, in 2:24. That was on Saturday night, Aug. 16 and a note said, raining hard, very muddy track.

At Batavia Downs, Batavia, N. Y., the 12-year-old pacer Money-maker by Singing Sam 2:12, won the C Pace, purse \$600, in 2:15 4/5. In a match race at Rimouski, Que., Filbert, formerly owned by Wal Hennessy of this city, was 2-2 to Sonny Leo, time, 2:10 3/5, 2:14. Indian Land, the horse that started Joe O'Brien on the road to fame in the U. S. A., is now owned in Quebec and we notice where he won the Free For All Pace there Aug. 12. In straight heats, time, 2:08 1/5, 2:07 1/5. At Roosevelt Raceway Earle Avery won the Two Year Old Trot purse \$2,000, with Victory Mon by Hoot Mon, time, 2:09 2/5, one of the fastest miles by a two-year-old stallion over a half-mile track this season.

A dispersal sale of the brood mares, yearlings and weanlings owned by the estate of the late Henry Knauf, took place at Siskiyou Farm, Ladd, Illinois, last week. It resulted in a total of \$69,475 being realized for 38 brood mares, some with foals alongside, sold with them, that realized \$45,125, while 18 yearlings reached \$15,150 for an average of \$841. The top price was the \$4,750 of Castleton Farm for the Calumet Adam brood mare Sue Adam p. 3, 2:03 3/4, dam of Atomic Bomb p. 3, 2:00 3/4, with a weanling by Brookdale by her side. The Siskiyou Farm was built up through the years by Mr. Knauf, who at the time of his death was President of the United States Trotting Association. He was a very fine man and a most likeable one and his farm was just commencing to turn out high-class trotters and pacers when he passed on.

Among the new or reduced records at Charlottetown Friday night, Aug. 22nd, is that of the trotter Frisco the Great, owned by Rex Sonier and driven by Don McNeill, time, 2:18 1/5. The same evening Face Cloth by Squire Hanover, owned by Clayton Green, Emerald, and driven by Harold Stead, took a record of 2:15 2/5. The trotter Rajah Hanover by Dean Hanover 1:58 1/2, owned by Myron Bell and driven by Eric Moreside, took a

new record Saturday night at Charlottetown of 2:13 3/5. Turf Club secretary James Ferguson of Sydney, N. S. has lined up the following card of races for Cape Breton next week. Monday afternoon (Labor Day) at the Exhibition in North Sydney—Northside Downs—Tuesday night at the Sports Center, Sydney, Wednesday afternoon at Northside Downs and Friday night at the Sports Center, Sydney. It is expected that at least twelve trotters and pacers from Prince Edward Island will be over for the big week in Cape Breton and other horses from all over the Maritimes are also expected.

Last Saturday night they had a particularly good card of racing. Truro and one of the featured was the winning of the 6th race by the 5-year-old gelding Symbol Majesty, brought to the Maritimes last June by B. J. Mitton of Moncton, and in the stable of Harley Harrison. He won in the excellent time of 2:12 1/5—a new record. Billy P. C. Parker (A. Gould) was 2. In the 9th race with the same field, Billy P. C. Parker won in 2:13 with Follow Up, Jr. (Daniels) 2. The pacer Ridgewood M. that was quite a winner last season and took a record of 2:11 3/5, also showed his best form of the year by winning for owners McCuspie & McGregor, with Frank Daniels up, time, 2:14. In the 1st race Lombardy Peter (MacLeod) was 2nd. He also won the 4th race in 2:15 4/5 with Clipper Dale (Wisener) 2. Luscilia (Pinkney) 3. Our old friend Baron, owned and driven by Roy Kidney, won the 2nd race in 2:19 with Just Nellie C. (Dobson) formerly owned by Dr. R. F. Seaman, 2nd. The trotter Westphal Girl, that was a winner at Charlottetown Old Home Week, was 1st to the wire in the 5th race for owner-driver George Turner of Dartmouth, time, 2:14 2/5. We have a great liking for this mare and believe she will eventually take a record much faster than her present mark. She is by Calumet Duds 2:09 1/2, that is out of the same dam as Abbe Worley 2:05, owned by Frank McKay, and he is sired by Peter the Brewer 2:02, the sire of Calumet Budlong 2:02 3/4, also owned by Frank McKay.

Recent winners at St. John Exhibition Park night races are Playaway by Playdale, owned and driven by M. R. Downey of St. John, in the 1st race, time, 2:23 3/5. Double winners were Piney Boy, owned by Goodwill, Stables, St. John, winner of the 4th and 8th races, best time 2:15. Our old friend Monty Budlong by Calumet Budlong owned by Lloyd McKinney, Gagetown, and driven by C. Wood, won the 5th and 9th races, best time 2:17 3/5. The second best summary was Adagio, owned by C. M. Alexander, St. John, New-look (Devlin) was 3rd in the final dash, Gerlie Reardon, owned by W. Johnston, Halifax, and driven by H. Crawford, won the 2nd race in 2:22 and was second in the 6th race which was won by Canada Brooke, owned and driven by J. L. McNamara, St. John, time, 2:22. There was a dead heat for first in the 3rd race between Colonel Sherbrooke, owned by F. Moreside of Sackville, and Dr. Bunter, owned by Frank Pineo of Fredericton, time, 2:20.

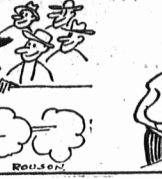

Benny Carson, talented left-hander on the Curran and Briggs mound staff, stated last night that he did not intentionally hit any of the Abbies batters in Summerside on Wednesday afternoon. In a telephone call, which we put through, Benny told us that he certainly had no intentions of hitting anyone and that he was not levelling off at the bors as had been charged.

Three of those balls which hit batters were curves, Carson told us. He added that the other two were low balls which hit the batters on the lower part of the leg when he tried to shoot the ball in there to get ahead of the opposing player. From a baseball viewpoint alone, he stated that it would be to his disadvantage to hit anyone as that player automatically draws a base which would mean the same thing as a base hit.

Benny, however, was more disturbed about the harm that a ball would do to the batter rather than the fact that the batter got to base. He stated that he did not go over to speak to the hit batters on account of the different things he had been advised to do on such occasions. Some had advised him, he stated, not to speak to the batter about the matter at the time of the incident as there might be bad feeling and trouble might develop.

Coach Johnny Carroll certainly did not think that Carson was attempting to bean anyone. You can always tell when a pitcher is trying to hit a batter and Benny wasn't doing it on Wednesday, he stated. He said that it is quite a common practise for pitchers to throw balls close to the batters in the major leagues and that quite a few batters are hit in the process. Johnny added that he was very sorry that any of the Abbies batters were hit and that any incidents occurred.

When the Junior Abbies take to the field against Curran and Briggs on Sunday afternoon in the fifth game of the series, it is highly unlikely that they will be coached by Ev. MacNeill. The Abbies were unable to obtain the use of Memorial Field for practise yesterday evening and Ev, who has worked with the Juniors throughout the summer months, stated he was through as far as playing ball on Memorial Field was concerned.

MacNeill said he would take the team and play on any other diamond. "We had trouble getting the field all summer," he stated. Yesterday when I arrived out there with the players we were told the field was not available for baseball. With the possibility of using two new infielders Sunday we needed the practise more than we did at any time all season, he stated. Later in the evening the field was used by the Playground Commission who sponsored a programme to wind up their summer's work on the City Squares.

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poor sportsmanship, whichever way you look at it.

We think Benny made one mistake. He could have shown a little more concern over his victims, and the fact that he did not put him in a bad light Alan Stewart, in his earlier days, when he had a world of stuff and little control, used to hit a lot of batters. But he always trotted over to express his regrets. It's a little gesture that helps, we think. It may have been thoughtlessness on Benny's part, or it may be that he was not on the best of terms with those boys. But in any case this omission does not justify anyone's accusing him of throwing deliberate "dusters".

We deplore the fact that a sports writer who didn't even see the game, should see fit to insinuate that our C. & B. boys did not win Wednesday's ball game fairly, basing his opinion on hearsay evidence only, and that all from one side. British justice demands that both sides be heard before such pronouncements be given.

Summerside fans feel very strongly about this attempt to minimize their hard-fought victory. A number of them have asked us to present the C. & B.'s and Benny Carson's case, and we have tried to do so, fairly and above-board.
