## Prince Lions Clubs Active

Although organized for only a few months, the four Lions Clubs in Prince County have proven that theirs is an organization worthy of being called a community service club. The first club to be organized in the county was the Summerside club and the formation of the Alberton, O'Leary and Kensington clubs followed shortly after. In the meantime these different clubs have gone quietly ahead with their work, first coming into prominence with their project of distributing their share of comfort during the Christmas season.

One of the principal projects sponsored by Lions Club International is that each separate club is encouraged to aid in the conservation of eyesight, give comfort to those totally blind by assisting them to become employed where possible, providing entertainment such as picnics, bowling, dancing etc. The various clubs work in conjunction with the Canadian Institute for the Blind and along this line the four Prince County clubs are now sponsoring an essay contest "Care of Your Eyes" for grade 7 pupils. The essay will be judged by a special committee of the four clubs.

particularly worthy effort to assist along the lines laid down by Lions International was made by the Summerside club within the last few days. Acting on information given by the public health nurse, Miss Barbara Smith, the Summerside club arranged for eye inspection for a number of children of the town and as a result of the examination, provided glasses for seven children who otherwise would not be able to afford them and who would possibly lose their eyesight in later life had it not been for the generous gesture of the Summerside Lions Club.

A spokesman for the club said last evening that although funds are at present limited it is their intention to do all they possibly can for the blind in this county as well as for the conservation of eyesight where it is deemed necessary.

## Reports Gas Pipeline Plans Going Ahead

OTTAWA (CP) — Plans for a natural gas pipeline from Alberta to eastern Canada are going ahead "as rapidly as possible," president N. E. Tanner of Trans-Canada Pipe Lines Ltd. said Thursday.

He spoke to the board of transport commissioners shortly before it gave the company a six-month deferral on a deadline for showing financial capability to build the proposed \$350,000,000 line to stretch 2,200 miles from the Alberta border to Montreal.

The new deadline is Oct. 31. The change was sought by the company because of delays in financing arrangements caused by difficulties in completing contracts for the purchase of gas in the west and its sale along the pipeline route.

The board granted the time extension after a one-day hearing at which it heard the company has arranged a supply of United States gas for a proposed service to Montreal in advance of construction of the main all-Canadian line.
