

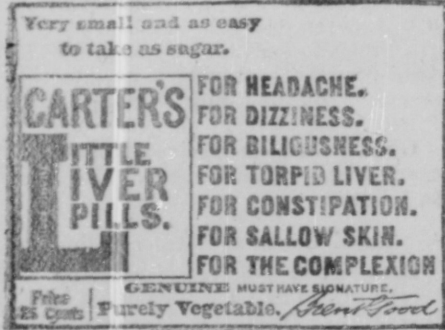

LETTER FROM THE WEST.

Mr. Westaway, an Island Mounted Policeman, Writes Home.

Mr. J. J. Westaway, one of the Islanders now in the North West Mounted Police, has written a letter to a friend in Charlottetown. It is dated Regina, March 30th, and is descriptive of the trip to the West. We are permitted to publish the following:

"We have arrived here after a tiresome ride across Canada. At the Ottawa depot we were received by Sir Louis Davies, who called us out of the train personally and gave us a hearty handshake. We also met Mr. A. C. McDonald, of Montague and Mr. Owen.
On Wednesday morning, about nine o'clock, we caught the first sight of the broad and level prairie with its dark soil. At ten o'clock we reached Winnipeg. Here, in this great city, we saw all classes of people. Doukhobors were abundant. The Islanders had a photo taken in Winnipeg.

When we arrived at Regina we marched to barracks, about two miles from the city. We had our breakfast in barracks, and were afterwards given four blankets and a straw mattress each, and shown to a room with ten beds in it. From there we went about the buildings and saw some of the horses. In one place were four Indian prisoners with a shackle on their feet to which was attached a chain about four feet long with a clog of steel on the end of it. Standing guard over the Indians was a policeman with a loaded revolver. They were working. Some were imprisoned for stealing, others for getting drunk and various misdemeanors. We had nothing to do the first day. We had some real pleasure in witnessing the splendid horsemanship of the police when breaking in horses. The bronchos kick and jump continually, and are always trying to throw their rider; but I believe a galling gun would not get them off.
We had our first drill this morning. It was a short one, about an hour, and we are off duty for today. Here we have every convenience,—reading room, gymnasium, baths, all sorts of games. There is a piano here and abundance of music. The regulations require us to be in our room at half-past nine at night, up at six, breakfast at seven, dinner at twelve, supper at six. There is very little snow here now.

I will write again and describe our work when we are better acquainted with it.
