

Mr. MacNaught Unanimous Choice Of Convention

J. Watson MacNaught, Parliamentary Assistant to the Minister of Fisheries, received the unanimous nomination of the delegates assembled in the Civic Auditorium last night, to contest this district in the next federal election.

His name was moved by Charles Moreshead and supported by Edson Rayner, Clermont.

In accepting the nomination Mr. MacNaught said: "I am really indeed pleased on this fourth occasion to receive the approbation of my fellow Liberals. I know of no greater honor."

Mr. MacNaught recalled the occasion of his first nomination when he had promised to work in the best interests of the Liberal Party and said that since that time he had endeavored to give his best to the cause.

"These have been happy years for me," he said, "and I have been stimulated by the work and enthusiasm put forth by my fellow Liberals in my behalf."

Mr. MacNaught said there is no doubt that a federal election

will be held in about six months, most probably in June.

He reminded the delegates that his predictions that the airport in Summerside, where a contract for a million and a half dollars has been completed in the last six months, has been maintained and will continue to be kept open.

Mr. MacNaught, in touching briefly on world conditions, warned against any criticism of any government action and quoted leading editorial writing in support of the Federal Government in its stand regarding the world situation.

Barn Burns At Conway

Fire, believed caused by spontaneous combustion in the hayloft, completely destroyed a large barn belonging to Robert H. Palmer, Conway, Saturday around 6:30 p.m.

Lost in the 30 by 65 building were about 120 tons of hay, 75 of which had been baled in the past summer. No animals or machinery were in the structure. It was fast consumed by flames shortly after the fire was first noticed by James Tuplin when he heard a sharp explosion which rocked the building.

Neighbors who gathered were unable to do anything to save the structure which together with another small outbuilding undamaged by the fire, is some distance from Mr. Palmer's farm. There is no fire fighting equipment at Conway.

The barn lost in the fire, a few years ago was remodelled by Mr. Palmer at a cost of around \$4,000.00. It is understood there is some insurance.

WHEAT SUPPLY UP

OTTAWA (CP)—Despite a 12,000,000-bushel increase in its exports during August and September, Canada had seven per cent more wheat on its hands at Oct. 1 than a year earlier. The bureau of statistics reported Tuesday that wheat supplies in Canada Oct. had risen to 857,900,000 bushels from 803,700,000 a year previous.

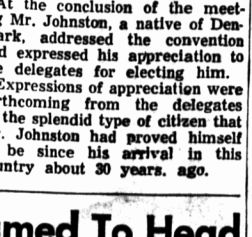

The treasurer, Mr. MacNevin, paid tribute to the members who had served on the various committees during the past year and said that it was due to the fine

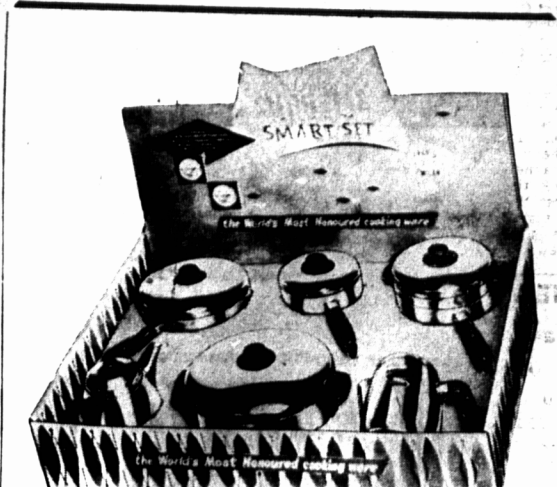
