The Best Men.

We ask the people of the Maritime Provinces to bear in mind that, if a Liberal Conservative Government be formed, Tupper, Tilley, Pope, James McDonald, and Mitchell or King will, in all probability, be members of the Cabinet. But, if the Government be sustained, Coffin, Burpee, Jones and Smith will continue meekly to carry out the schemes of McKenzie, Cartwright and Mills. In other words, if the Conservatives gain the day, the Maritime Provinces will be represented in the Cabinet by able men. If the Government be sustained, the Maritime Provinces will continue to be represented by political nonentities—and Mr. L. H. Davies is of opinion that such men are only a drawback to the Provinces to which they belong! Better not to have a representative in the Cabinet at all, than to have such representatives as Coffin and company. So says Mr. L. H. Davies.

Hon. Dr. Tupper's Speech at Baddeck, Cape Breton.

DR. TUPPER'S reception, as signified by the address presented to him on his arrival at Baddeck on the 19th inst., was truly gratifying. His speech on the occasion, in reply to the address of the people, was listened to with marked attention, and was the subject of fear and trembling to his opponents. The McKenzie Administration which, as he said a few years ago, was looked upon as occupying an impregnable position, now stands trembling in the presence of the people, conscious that the hour is near at hand when it is to receive at the hands of an indignant and outraged people, dismissal from the position of trust and power to which it attained by means of the most discreditable, and which it has abused by gross incapacity.

No better evidence of the downfall of the present blundering administration can be given than the fact that four years ago it had a majority of over ninety members at its back; to-day that number is reduced below forty. No Government ever came into power in a better position to give satisfaction to the country than the McKenzie Government. They had not only a large majority in the House of Commons disposed to sustain them, but the Opposition also gave them all possible assistance in perfecting measures calculated to benefit the country. The Opposition, led by Sir John A. Macdonald, had a higher and nobler object in view than their own aggrandizement as a party. He (Dr. Tupper) then proceeded to show the causes which lead to the great change in public opinion within the past few years—a change which would result in the complete overthrow of the present Government.

He reviewed the action of the McKenzie Administration touching taxation, showing very clearly that the country was burdened with taxes, which required re-adjustment in order to give a stimulus to the industries of the country. He said the Liberal-Conservative Party did not want to levy more taxes, they could do with less, but they would levy them more fairly than they were now. They could so adjust the tariff as to give employment to our people within our own borders, instead of compelling them to turn their backs on the homes of their fathers, or the land of their adoption, and go to a foreign land to obtain that employment which, under the miserable, short-sighted policy of the present Government, is denied them at home.

A bigamist in the person of a Nova Scotian named John Lynch was examined before two magistrates of Belle Creek on Friday last, and on Saturday committed to the jail of this county to await his trial in the Supreme Court for bigamy. Lynch took up his residence at Belle Creek three years ago, and at that place has since pursued his occupation of carpenter. He became very intimate with the fair sex of that district, and finally won and wed the daughter of a most respectable farmer. Everything went on smoothly until the arrival of wife No. 1 from Truro, N. S., on Thursday evening, whose appearance at the residence of her "lost husband" created no dull glimmer of consternation. She left her case in the hands of two magistrates, and Mr. Lynch is now in jail awaiting the result.

THE Rev. Father Kennedy, of Syracuse, New York, delivered a most stirring temperance address before the members of St. Patrick's T. A. Society, in St. Patrick's Hall, last evening. The hall was overcrowded on the occasion, and the address listened to with marked attention. At the close, the rev. gentleman was loudly applauded.

At the Stipendiary Magistrate's Court, this forenoon, Thomas Noonan appeared for assaulting Thomas Larter with a knife. He was remanded to jail for 8 days. Daniel Madden was sentenced to 12 hours' imprisonment for stealing cherries from Dr. Mackieson's garden; Pierce Larter, for the same offense, was sentenced to forty-eight hours' imprisonment.

A MEETING of the City Council was held on Saturday evening. The principal business before the Council was the consideration of the report of the Wharf Committee with regard to further extending the width of Pownal Wharf. They reported in favor of the offer made by Messrs. Sinnott and Callaghan at the last Council meeting; but it was decided to call for tender for the performance of the work.

ON Saturday night, at half-past ten o'clock, a truckman named Thomas Larter was seriously stabbed by a denizen of the West Bog—named Thomas Noonan—the fellow who stabbed John McLaughlin, and served two years in jail for the act. The stabbing occurred during an assault—which Noonan says was made on him by a crowd of unknowns—while he was standing in the door of his residence. He asserts that the person he stabbed kicked him in the stomach without the least provocation. The gash inflicted is on Larter's right thigh; is about five inches long, and is open to the bone. Immediately after Larter received it, he proceeded to the Apothecaries' Hall, where the wound was stitched and dressed by Dr. Jenkins. He suffered much from loss of blood, and became so weak that he had to be carried from the Apothecaries Hall on a stretcher. Noonan was arrested and appeared before the Stipendiary Magistrate this morning for trial. Larter was unable to appear, and the prisoner was remanded to jail for eight days.

NEWS BY TELEGRAPH.

Special Despatch to Examiner:

BERLIN, July 28.

Austrian subjects residing in Servia, and belonging to the Austrian reserves, are peremptorily summoned to join their battalions. This creates uneasiness, because it indicates far greater mobilization than was originally intended for the occupation of Bosnia.

CONSTANTINOPLE, July 28.

Austrian troops will enter Bosnia to-day, though no convention is concluded.

It is expected that troops will encounter armed resistance.

The Russians have occupied chief positions around Shumla.

The Russian authorities have categorically assured the Porte that the Imperial Guard will embark and other Russian forces retire as soon as Verna has surrendered.

ATHENS, July 28.

The French iron-clad squadron has sailed for the Piræus.

CONSTANTINOPLE, July 28.

Osman Pasha has ordered the discontinuance of work at the entrenchments on the Constantinople lines, all probability of a conflict with Russia having disappeared.

The Porte intends to issue a memorandum relative to the Greek question.

Greece has applied to Prince Bismarck, as President of the Congress, to make representations to induce the Turks to come to an arrangement.

LONDON, July 28.

The Post's Berlin despatch states that Russia is still negotiating for the purchase of fast North German Lloyds and Hamburg steamers.

A despatch to the Post from Berlin says that two pellets came out of the Emperor's arm during the week by suppuration.

ST. JOHN, July 29.

No prospect of boat-race coming off to-day. Wind high.

At Clifton, on Friday morning, the 12th inst., John McGregor, aged 47 years, esteemed and respected by all with whom he was acquainted.

Suddenly, on the 11th inst., at her residence, Linkletter Road, Susan, the beloved wife of Geo. Linkletter, Elder, aged 51 years. The comparatively early death of this amiable and excellent woman is regretted, not only by her sorrowing husband and numerous family, but also by a wide circle of friends who esteemed the deceased as one who in an uncommon degree adorned her Christian profession.

A Bye-Law for Levying an Assessment on Real Property in the City of Charlottetown.

(Passed by the City Council 19th July, 1878.)

WHEREAS, it is necessary and expedient to pass a By-Law for the purpose of levying an Assessment on the rental of Freehold and Leasehold Property in the City of Charlottetown, for City and School purposes, for the current year ending on the twenty sixth day of May, in the year of our Lord one thousand eight hundred and seventy nine,—

Be it therefore enacted by the City Council of the City of Charlottetown as follows:—

1. There shall be paid by the occupants or owners of Freehold or Leasehold Property within the City of Charlottetown, for City and School purposes, the following sum, that is to say, the sum of Twelve Cents on every Dollar of the rental for the current year ending on the twenty-sixth day of May, in the year of our Lord one thousand eight hundred and seventy-nine, according to the valuations entered against the names of each and every person in the Valuation Book of Real Property made by the Assessors of the City of Charlottetown, and returned by the said Assessors to the said City Council on the twelfth day of July, in the year of our Lord One Thousand Eight Hundred and Seventy-eight.

2. In cases where the occupant named in the Assessment Book of real property, made by the said Assessors of the City of Charlottetown, shall have left the premises so assessed before the time of giving the notice of assessment required by law, such notice shall be served upon the person or persons actually in possession; and, if the premises be vacant, then such notice shall be served upon the owner or owners thereof, or his or their agent; and such owner or owners shall be deemed, for the purposes of this law, the occupant or occupants; and such occupant or occupants, shall be severally liable for the payment of the sum entered against the name of the original occupant or occupants in the Assessment Book of Real Property made up by the said Assessors of the said City, and deposited with the City Clerk, subject to the same right of appeal as the person or persons originally assessed was or were entitled to.

3. In cases where tenement houses containing two or more occupants, and where either the owner or one occupant was originally assessed, the City Collector shall have power and authority to divide and apportion such assessment between the several occupants in proportion to their several or respective rents, in order that the notices for assessment may be served on such occupants in due form.
