SUPREME COURT.

WEDNESDAY, June 27. The Queen vs. Benjamin and William Vaughan—Indictment for three separate larcenies from S. B. Enos, Vernon McLeod and William Bastian. The Grand Jury find a "true bill."

The Queen vs. John Crane—Indictment for larceny. The Grand Jury find a "true bill."

The Grand Jury also brought in a bill of indictment against Israel Thorp and Jane Thorp, for receiving stolen goods. Everything was scrupulously clean, and evinced a great desire on the part of the Superintendent and his assistants to do all in their power for the helpless creatures under their charge. In the male department the Grand Jury find that there are two bedrooms 13 feet, by 22 by 11, occupied by nine patients, and in their opinion these rooms are entirely too small for the health and comfort of the occupants. In the female department there is another room containing eleven beds, which, also, in the opinion of the Grand Jury, is entirely too small for the number of persons sleeping there. The food provided for the patients was very good, with the exception of the butter, which, on examination, was found to be very inferior in quality and unfit to be used by the inmates. It is recommended that the butter be of Island manufacture and not imported.

At the poor house and jail the inmates were well satisfied with the treatment they received, and the buildings are kept in the best order possible. It is respectfully suggested that a cooking department be built at the Poor House, as the inmates eat and cook in the one room at present, which, it is really seen, is an injury to the health and comfort of the poor creatures who have to pass their lives there.

In the case of Christy Murray, a young woman confined in Queen's County Jail, the Grand Jury would recommend her immediate release, as she is now very sick.

In the case of another person, John Fower, it is recommended that the Jailor be instructed to supply sufficient for his maintenance.
