TELEGRAPHIC NEWS.

SPECIAL DESPATCHES TO THE EXAMINER. Ottawa News Notes.

OTTAWA, June 28. President Fover, of the Dominion Dairy Association, is here consulting with the Minister of Agriculture as to the most beneficial methods of expending the special grant made at the last session of parliament.

Official reports from the protective cruisers indicate a small catch of fish. Skinner, of the crofter commission, who has just returned from the Northwest, reports the crofters doing well and the possibilities of success unlimited.

Father Whelan, of Ottawa, recently issued a challenge, with \$500 forfeit, to any person who would prove the charge that the Jesuits have ever taught the doctrine that "the end justifies the means." The challenge has been accepted by Doctor Hurlburt, of this city. In a letter to-night Father Whelan indicates his readiness to carry out the challenge, and theologians are much exercised over the coming contest. Prof. Scrimgeour, of Montreal, is named as one of the arbitrators.

Mr. Anderson, of the steamship service, leaves to-night, having completed his business with the Government.

Bishop Cleary's Departure.

KINGSTON, Ont., June 28. The departure of Bishop Cleary for Ireland to accept a diocese there is causing comment in Catholic circles. It is said that it is the direct outcome of the death of Archbishop Lynch and the subsequent choosing of his successor. It is understood that there were two names mentioned for the vacancy. At consultation held by the Bishops of the Province, Bishop Walsh, of London, and Bishop Cleary, of Kingston, and Bishop Dowling, then of Peterboro', siding in favor of Bishop Walsh, leaving Bishop Cleary in the minority. The matter was referred to Rome, and now, the story goes, Bishop Cleary accepts the Irish diocese by way of compromise, thus making the Walsh nomination for the Toronto Archbishopric unanimous.

Swedish Bark Seized.

BATHURST, N. B., June 28. The Swedish bark Elba, now loading deals, was seized by Special Customs Officer P. J. O'Keefe yesterday, for an infraction of the Revenue Act committed in Campbellton last season. It seems that a quantity of liquors, etc., were landed from the vessel and were discovered by Mr. O'Keefe after the vessel had sailed. The master claims that he did not sell or receive anything for the articles sold. However he was fined \$400, and was given until to-day to pay up or make a deposit. The result is the ship is now in the hands of the Collector of Customs, awaiting further developments.

QUEBEC, June 28. The Governor-General has sent a letter to the President of the St. Jean Baptiste Society, regretting his inability to attend the recent inauguration of the Jacques Cartier monument. His Excellency's ball in the Citadel is fixed for the 16th July. The Brandy Manufacturing Co., of Bordeaux, have sent \$500 to the St. Saviour fire fund.
