COMIC STRIPS NOT READING FOR SUNDAY

Timely Protest Sounded By Conservative Leader In Parliament.

(C.P. By Guardian's Special Wire) OTTAWA, May 19—Bachelor R. B. Bennett and benedict Charles Dunning today exchanged notes on the proper Sunday morning reading for growing children. They both agreed and disagreed on the question of newspaper comic supplements. When Mr. Bennett was prime minister a tariff was imposed on printed supplements containing comics for insertion in Sunday newspapers. Today the House of Commons approved removal of that tariff as proposed in the budget drawn up by Mr. Dunning now minister of finance. Mr. Bennett thought Mr. Dunning was wrong. "I can't see that Moon Mullins adds very much to the stock of knowledge of a young and growing child," said Mr. Bennett. He also said one popular comic placed a premium on fraud, lying and deceit, and was based on the success of two children in escaping the just retribution for their sins. While some comics were instructive and not objectionable he suggested that as a whole they were "not the best reading for children on Sunday morning."

It was true Mr. Bennett placed a duty on comics, said Mr. Dunning, but it was also true the duty did not keep comics away from Canadian children. "If we are going to approach this matter from the very lofty standpoint of Mr. Bennett," he said, "we will have to approach it in some other way than by the imposition of a tariff."

While listening to Mr. Bennett, the minister said, he had thought of the saying that an old maid knew more about bringing up children than a mother. As a father he admired Mr. Bennett's bachelor knowledge of the subject. He suggested, however, Mr. Bennett forgot that prohibitions sometimes increased the desire for the thing prohibited.

Comics, said Mr. Bennett, were "one more of those unconscious influences which help to shape our national character." "If we look abroad," he said, "and see the disorder in some parts of this continent we cannot help but see the necessity of maintaining the safeguards the founders of this country thought desirable. It cannot be a good thing to teach our young people that man owes no duty to his fellows and that an undisciplined horde canst take a nation."

H. E. Wilson (Cons. Hamilton West) said Communists literature printed in New York was coming into Canada in large quantities. It was designed to wreck established institutions and poison the minds of the youth. Rev. Minister Isley said his department had power to stop reasonable or reditious literature at the border. In addition, the criminal code provided penalties for seditious literature printed in Canada.

The Conservative leader referred to a New York paper which printed a scurrilous article dealing with King George. It was an editorial which to him was so offensive it aroused resentment. A. W. Neill (Ind. Comox-Alberni) gave his opinion all books and pamphlets should bear the printer's name. They were often scurrilous, anonymous and hence untraceable.

The finance minister agreed with the British Columbia member on this point "owing to a recent experience." The difficulty was a man who tried to sign his name to a libellous pamphlet could circumnavigate the intended change in the law. Mr. Bennett said the libel laws of Canada should be overhauled. He said there was a magazine in Canada which attacked public men all the time in the name of liberty. He said the magazine was libellous and seditious and went far beyond the field of right criticism. The Conservative leader said he could sympathize with the finance minister on the subject of libellous, anonymous attacks. In the last five or six years there had been many scurrilous attacks on him, one pamphlet going the length of calling him a murderer in a story arising from the Regina riots.

The difficulty, said Hon. Charles Maclell (Lib. Bonaventure) was the enforcement of law by the provinces. There should be some federal officer who could be a general censor.
