Montague Rink Opens For Season

The Montague Community Rink opened last night for its first public skate of the season. Operation ice making was begun only this week by the manager, Mr. Cecil Bell, and already there are almost three inches of ice. A short hockey practice was held on Thursday night with a considerable number of young hopefuls present to try out for the team, and it looks as if Montague will be represented in the Southern King's loop again this year. Up to the present there has been no joint meeting of Georgetown, Murray Harbour, and Montague. However, it is expected that one will be held shortly. Plans are also in formation for the organization of several younger teams, so that they will have the benefit of coaches to teach them the fundamentals of hockey, and with the retention of age groups, it is hoped that more even competition will develop. Thus with these plans the community may look forward to an active season in the local rink.

MONTREAL, Dec. 28 - (CP) - Canadian Pacific Railway Co. today reported net earnings for November at \$5,972,475, compared with \$4,513,045 in the corresponding month last year. Gross earnings amounted to \$35,100,628, against \$32,166,258 a year ago, while working expenses were \$29,128,153, compared with \$27,655,212 in the same month of the preceding year.

Fishermen's Loan Board Inquiry Held At Montague

Following is the conclusion of the evidence taken before Judge J. S. DesRoches, sitting as a Commission at Montague on Thursday in connection with an inquiry into the operations of the Fishermen's Loan Board. Mr. J. O. C. Campbell, K.C., appeared as counsel for the Commission:

Jack Campbell (sworn)

Q-You are a farmer at Victoria Cross? A-Yes. Q-I believe you got a loan from the Fishermen's Loan Board? A-Yes, Sir, I did not get a loan. Q-Did you fill out an application? A-Yes, Sir. Q-Now the time that you made out these papers, Mr. Watterworth has said that you were in Ontario at the time? A-Yes, it wasn't that winter that I was in Ontario, it was the next winter-1948. Q-When you made out the papers for this loan you were here then? A-Yes. Judge DesRoches: Q-Fishermen's Loan Board application? A-Yes. Mr. Campbell: Q-Did you make out these papers through Watterworth? A-Yes. Q-Mr. Watterworth made out the papers and you signed them? A-Yes. Q-Do you know who recommended your application? A-No, I don't know. Q-Whoever recommended them they did not go through, you did not get your money? A-That's right. Q-Did you enquire from Mr. Watterworth when you didn't get your money? A-No, Sir, I didn't. Q-I don't mean to cross-examine you, but it is a little unusual that a man would apply for a loan and not enquire about it? A-Well, I took the papers up to Dr. Grant and he did not have time to sign them so I didn't bother with them afterwards. Q-You took the papers up to Dr. Grant after you filled out the papers? A-Yes. Q-And he said he was busy? A-Yes, I took them back to Watterworth and told him Grant did not sign them so I didn't bother with them afterwards. The R.C.M.P. came to the room where I was staying in Brantford, Ontario, and questioned me about the loan. Q-It would appear that the loan must have gone through in your name? A-Yes. Q-You don't know how much? A-I think it was \$100.00. Q-And you never got the money? A-No. Judge DesRoches: Q-Do you know anything about the transactions between Dr. Grant and Mr. Watterworth? A-No. Mr. Campbell: Q-Did you ever done any fishing? A-No, I was never a fisherman. Harland Campbell (sworn) Mr. Campbell: Q-You are a brother of Jack Campbell? A-Yes. Q-And you live at Victoria Cross? A-Yes. Q-Are you a farmer too? A-Yes. Q-Did you get a loan through the Fishermen's Loan Board? A-No. Q-Did you fill out papers for a loan? A-Yes. Q-The same way as your brother? A-Yes. Q-There was some talk that you were away in Ontario at the time? A-The papers were filled out and I went to Ontario the following month of the same year. Q-1947? A-Yes. Q-So when you filled out the papers you were living here? A-

Yes. Q-Are you a truckman? A-Yes. Q-You used to work for Wilfred Watterworth? A-Yes. Q-Are you working on your own now? A-Yes. Q-When you were working for Watterworth he was operating a cold storage plant? A-Yes. Q-How many years were you with him? A-A year and a half. Q-Did you get a fishermen's loan? A-Yes. Q-How did it go through, the same as these others? A-Yes. Q-Mr. Watterworth made out the papers and you signed them? A-Yes. Q-Did you ever done any fishing? A-No. Q-How much money did you get? A-\$200.00. Q-I suppose you did not use it for fishing? A-No. Q-What did you use it for principally? A-I just spent it. Q-Are you married? A-Yes. Judge DesRoches: Q-Were you married at the time you got this loan? A-Yes. Mr. Campbell: Q-Did you use it to live on? A-Yes. Q-Have you ever repaid any of the money to the Fishermen's Loan Board? A-No. Q-Who endorsed your loan - recommended it? A-I don't remember now. Q-Did you take the application yourself to someone for approval? A-No. Q-You did not take it to Dr. Grant or Mr. Saville? A-No. Q-How did you get your money? A-I went into Charlottetown with Mr. Watterworth. Q-He got a cheque and gave you the money? A-Yes. Q-Do you know anything about any dealings with Dr. Grant? A-Yes, I just filled them out and then when I didn't get any money I didn't bother with it any more because I went away, I went away to Ontario. Q-You had never been a fisherman? A-No, never. Q-Did you intend to go fishing after you had got the loan, or had you been told that this money was on the go? A-Well, Sir, something of that nature. There was a story on the go that there was money to be had and I was told that the farmers as well as the fishermen were to get it. Q-Is there anything else you know about Fishermen's Loans? A-No. Q-How long did you stay away in Ontario? A-Two years. Q-You just came back last year? A-29th of September last year. Q-Your brother said the Mounties came to see him about his loan while he was in Ontario, did they come to see you? A-No, they didn't know where I was. Judge DesRoches: Q-Do you know anything about transactions between Dr. Grant and Wilfred Watterworth? A-No, Sir. Nathaniel Campbell (sworn) Mr. Campbell: Q-You live in Montague? A
