Adventists Launch Mission Appeal

Seventh-day Adventists will launch their annual world Mission Appeal here, April 26, R. G. Christiansen, local pastor announced today.

its \$800 goal in a four-week solicitation campaign. The Seventh-day Adventist church has carried its work of mercy into 228 of the 282 officially listed countries of the world.

Last year's drive, to which Charlottetown contributed liberally, netted \$2,882,000 for the medical, educational, and other activities carried on by Adventists around the world.

Members themselves each gave \$138.25 to the work of the church last year, Pastor Christiansen explained, "but the need is so great that our own gifts are not enough."

Last year's contributions by members and their friends have been earmarked for new hospitals in Pakistan and the French Cameroons of Africa; training schools in Borneo, Toradjaland, and Tahiti; a printing plant in Pakistan and an evangelistic center in Manila.
