Wings Lose Game But
Win 6th N. H. L. Title
As Bruins Top Toronto

DETROIT, (CP)— Detroit Red
Wings backed into their sixth con-
secutive National Hockey League
championship Saturday night as
little Camille Henry scored four
goals to give New York Rangers
a 5-2 victory over the league-lead-
ers.

Toronto Maple Leafs lost their
last chance of overtaking the
Wings by dropping a 2-1 decision
to the fourth-place Boston Bruins.
The Wings now have extended
their string of consecutive titles
two years longer than any other
team in NHL history. They broke
the old mark shared by the Bruins
and Montreal Canadiens last sea-
son.

Henry scored a goal in each of
the first two periods and salted the
game away with two markers with-
in 33 seconds of last-period play
while Detroit's Gordie Howe was
whiting out a penalty. Howe, and
rookie Bill Dineen scored for the
losers and Nick Mickoski accounted
for the fifth Ranger goal.
Henry, a graduate from last
year's Quebec Citadelle juniors first
year, scored a goal in the second
period on a fancy play in which
he skated from behind the Detroit
net and hooked the puck past
sprawling goalie Terry Sawchuk.

Nova Scotia champs 2-0.

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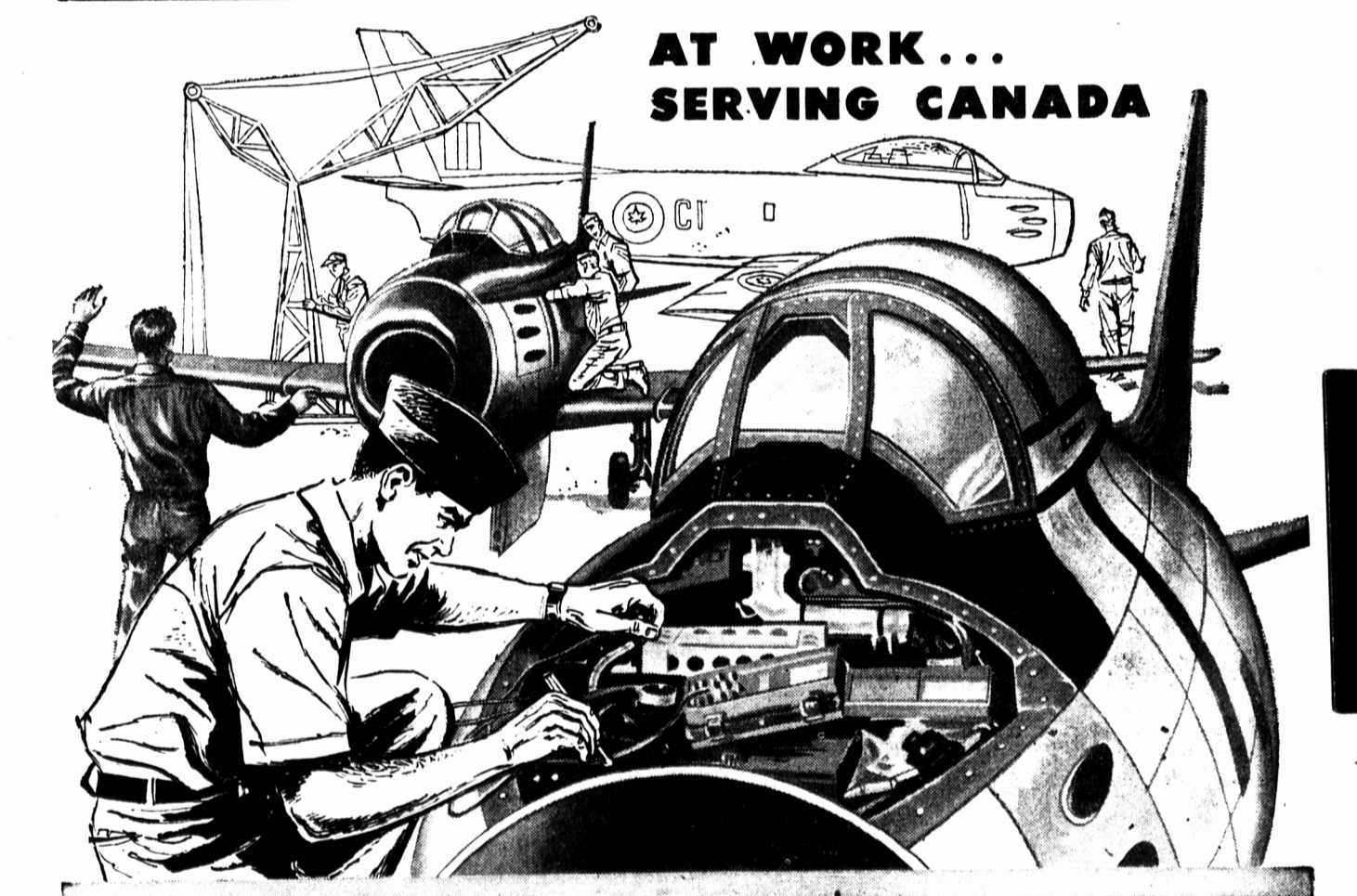

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MONTREAL, (CP)— Montreal
Canadiens bounced back as con-
tenders for a second-place finish
in the National Hockey League by
blanking the tail-end Chicago
Black Hawks 4-0 Saturday night.
With fine support by relief
goalie Jacques Plante, who turned
in his fourth shutout in 14 games,
the Montrealers were never in
serious trouble. Maurice (Rocket)
Richard bagged his 36th goal of
the season and the others went to
Lorne Davis, Jean Beliveau and
Bert Olmstead.
Canadiens might have won
farther away but for the smart
work of goalie Al Rollins, who had
40 shots in all tossed at him.
Plante handled 30 shots faultless-
ly.
Davis opened the scoring with a
slow shot, the puck sliding under
Rollins' leg to the far side of the
net. Less than two minutes later
Richard thrilled the crowd of 14-
136 by going all the way from cen-
tre ice. Picking up Elmer Lach's
pass, the Rocket stickhandled
through the Chicago defence of
Lee Fogolin and Bill Gadsby and
blasted a shot past Rollins.
Early in the second period Bel-
iveau neatly trapped a hard pass,
took a few strides and scored from
15 feet out. Six minutes later
Olmstead snapped in the rebound
of Richard's shot.

Toronto East York
Again Defeated
PARIS, (CP)—A team of Cana-
dians from the British Hockey
League Sunday won the Jean Poi-
tin Cup by defeating Toronto East
York 6-5 before a crowd of 6,900.

sented. The East York club, which
finished second to Russia in the
