Warm Audience Response To Talented Concertmen

A large and appreciative audience heard an outstanding program of vocal music at the Prince of Wales College hall on Saturday night, the artists being The Concertmen, a talented male ensemble, with Mr. Edmund Karlrud as director and leading soloist. This was the last of the season's entertainments by the Community Concert Association, and it made one of the most popular hits of any in the long series sponsored by the organization. Bass, baritone and even tenor parts were taken with remarkable ease and versatility by Mr. Karlrud, who also played an impressive role as master of ceremonies. He was capably supported by the ensemble members comprising William Pierce, David Hoover, Roy James, Charles Post, tenors; Donald Wittig, Charles Oliver, baritones; Frederick Bohrer, bass-baritone, and Richard Vogt, bass. Edward Schick also showed fine artistry in his piano accompaniment.

Baccalaureate Sermon Before SDU Graduates

"The greatest reality in man's life is the reality of Jesus Christ: once a man perceives the place of Jesus Christ in his own soul, nothing else counts," declared Very Rev. Robert A. MacDonald, C.S.S.R. Rector of St. Patrick's Church, Quebec City, who delivered the Baccalaureate Sermon to the graduating class of St. Dunstan's University at the opening of the 1957 Commencement Exercises which took place in the College Chapel yesterday morning.
Father MacDonald, a native of Brooklyn, N. Y. graduated from St. Dunstan's in 1927, and was ordained a priest of the Redemptorist Order in 1931. After many years of missionary labor in Canada and the Eastern United States, he was appointed to parish work, and is now in charge of a large parish in Quebec's provincial capital.
IMPRESSIVE OPENING
The 1957 exercises opened with Solemn High Mass celebrated by Rev. Richard Ellsworth, Vice Rector of the University. His Excellency, Most Rev. Malcolm A. MacEachern, D.D., Bishop of Charlottetown, assisted at the throne in cappa magna. Rev. William Simpson was Deacon and Rev. Reginald Phelan Sub-Deacon. Masters of Ceremonies were Rev. A.F. MacDonald and Very Rev. P.F. MacDonald. Most Rev. Patrick J. Skinner, C.M., D.D., Archbishop of St. John's, Nfld., was present in the sanctuary. Rev. F.P. Aylward and Rev. C. Moreau, C.S.S.R., Rector of Holy Redeemer Parish, were chaplains to His Excellency, Bishop MacEachern; Rev. K. C. MacPherson and Rev. A.L. Herrell, chaplains to His Excellency, Archbishop Skinner.
The College Choir was under the direction of Rev. Lawrence Landrigan, with Henry Gaudet, a member of the Class of '57, as organist.
Prior to the commencement of Solemn High Mass, the graduates, faculty, and clergy proceeded to the Chapel in academic procession.
The Exercises will be completed Tuesday afternoon in the Alumni Auditorium, when degrees will be conferred on the 32-member graduating class, and the address to the graduates will be delivered by His Excellency, Most Rev. Patrick J. Skinner, C.M., D.D., Archbishop of St. John's, Newfoundland.
EMPHASIS ON FAITH
Continuing his discourse on the virtue of Faith, Father MacDonald emphasized that "the perception of faith" was not "dependent on the intelligence" but "came from the Will of God."
"The womb of faith has no definite gestation in time," Nations and men fail to see that God is not revealed in history, but made history.
Noting that many men today are concerned with "the scientific approach" and wish to give everything "a proper place", Father MacDonald pointed out to the 1957 graduates that "man came before science" and that faith was not dependent on scientific analysis. Emphasizing that man was born "to know, love, and serve God", Father MacDonald said, "Life has but one destiny, one purpose—to reveal to us the presence of our Blessed Lord."
The Reverend speaker asked the Class of '57 to be "men and women with a message", noting that during His time on earth "our Blessed Lord gave no solution to social or economic problems", even though the world of His day was beset with many of these ills.
"His strange message was," said Father MacDonald, "those who would live, must die; those who would conquer, must take up the Cross; and those who would rejoice, must suffer."
Following the completion of the chapel service, luncheon was served in the college refectory.
