—People of Borden and surrounding districts were saddened on June 5, to learn of the death of one of Borden's highly respected citizens, Mr. William Pickering, who passed away at the Prince County Hospital after only a few hours' illness.

He had gone to Summerside on Thursday for a medical check-up and later decided to spend a few days with his friends at the Summerside race track. A lover of horses and horse-racing it was always a pleasure for him to watch the driver's training and working with the horses, and he was enjoying his visit with the trainers when he suffered a heart attack. His doctor was immediately summoned and he was taken to the P. C. Hospital but his condition became worse and soon his earthly pilgrimage was over.

Born at Clifton in 1869, he spent his early years with the trainees, married Bessie Underhill and resided in French River until ten years later when they moved with their family to Borden. Bill, as he was familiarly known, worked as deckhand on the ferry for 17 years before he decided to retire due to a heart attack. Although unable to work since that time he was able to be about and enjoy fellowship with the members of his family and the many friends who visited him. His sudden passing was a severe shock to his friends, neighbours and members of his family. By his fine personality, friendly smile and pleasant greetings he had endeared himself to all who knew him and the community has lost in him an honest, upright and highly esteemed citizen. He was a loving husband, kind and devoted father and a generous friendly neighbour.

The funeral was held on June 7, with a short service at the home and then to Borden United Church where friends gathered to pay their final respects to a friend well-beloved. The floral offerings were many and beautiful. Service was conducted by Rev. L. Murray of Kensington. Favourite selections were sung with Mrs. Shepherd, and Abide With Me. Mrs. Hedley Muttart feelingly rendered The Old Rugged Cross.

Besides his sorrowing wife he is survived by one daughter (Mrs. Preston Darrach) and two sons, Elwood and Wilford, all of Borden; also three half sisters, (Mrs. Claude Graham, (May), Mrs. Fred Pidgeon, (Alva), Mrs. Harry Somers) and a half-brother, John Currie, all of Clifton.

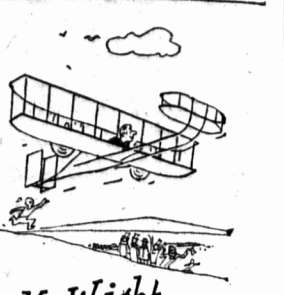
