New York Stocks

NEW YORK (AP)—The stock market advanced last week for the first time since the break that accompanied the start of Korean truce proposals more than a month ago.

One of the prime reasons for the advance, it was felt in Wall Street, was the flood of fine first-quarter earnings reports turned in by major corporations.

The Associated Press average of 60 stocks gained \$1.60 on the week and closed at \$109.00, just \$1.80 higher than the low of the year.

The market advanced Monday with steel in the forefront of the rise. That continued again Tuesday and Wednesday.

By Thursday the advance had worn rather thin, and the market backed down slightly.

Volume was on the low side all week with a daily average of 1,275,000 shares.

Willys-Overland, up 5-8 at 15 3-4 with 90,600 shares traded, was the most active issue.

Among Canadian issues, McIntyre closed 1-2 higher for the week. Dome was up 3-8. International Nickel was off a point at 40 1-8. On the American stock exchange, Lake Shore was unchanged at 8 1-8.

U. S. Steel Report

CLEVELAND (AP)—Steel production booms and higher prices loom. Steel Magazine said Sunday.

The nation's mills are operating at 100.5 per cent of their rated capacity, tons of molten steel for casting. The rate of production was up one point from the week before.

The metal-working journal noted prices rose so far have been only "extras" such as special sizes or kinds of steel. Low much the base price will go up, said the magazine, will not be known for several weeks.

Producers probably will wait until they can better appraise their cost position, after wage negotiations with the steelworkers unions.

The cost of scrap metal used in making steel dropped \$1 last week to \$41.67.

Home Economists Meet In Halifax

A meeting of the Planning Committee of the Maritime Home Economists Conference was held on Saturday, April 25th in Halifax.

Among those attending was Miss Elizabeth MacMillan, Acadia University, Wolfville, convener of the Maritime Planning Committee; Miss Elizabeth Magee, Acadia University, secretary of the Planning Committee; Dr. Juanita Archibald, president of the Nova Scotia Home Economists Association; and Miss Doris Anderson, Charlottetown, president of Prince Edward Island Home Economists Association.

Plans were discussed for the second Maritime Home Economists Conference, the first one having taken place in 1948.

At a tremendous success five years ago, the conference will take place in Amherst at the Fort Cumberland Hotel in October. Some of the most able speakers in Home Economists in Canada and the United States will participate in this three day convention.

Declares Soil Fertility Most Pressing Problem

OTTAWA (CP)—A CCF fruit grower-member of the Commons told Agriculture Minister Gardiner last week that soil fertility is Canada's most pressing long-range agricultural problem.

H. W. Herridge, who operates orchards in the Kootenay West constituency of British Columbia, said there should be a national policy to promote soil fertility and proper farming practices.

He praised the work of Prairie Farm Rehabilitation Administration officers on the Prairies and said provisions of that act should be applied across Canada.

He also suggested there should be some form of subsidy for soil conservation. Farmers might be given income tax exemptions for amounts they spend in conservation projects to increase fertility.

Nile Waters Will Flow Soon Beneath Suez Canal

CAIRO (Reuters)—The fresh waters of the Nile will soon flow beneath the Suez canal to irrigate the arid wastes of the North Sinai Desert.

Puad Galal, minister of national guidance, said Friday Egypt will soon begin work on the \$200,000,000 waterway so that 70,000 Arab refugees from Palestine can begin new life in the Sinai area.

Other rehabilitation plans costing \$8,000,000 will be carried out for the benefit of refugees at the same time.

The \$30,000,000 bill will be paid by the United Nations relief and works agency out of its \$200,000,000 self-support fund for Arab refugees.

Irrigation canals will spread over the treeless sandy plains of the peninsula, carrying new hope for the refugees, most of whom live in squalor in Arab countries. They work agricultural settlements and light industries.

The triangular peninsula, flanked by the Red Sea, Gulf of Suez and Aqaba, now is sparsely inhabited by about 37,000 Bedouins, scattered over the 24,000-square mile area in nomadic tribes.

The irrigation of the Sinai desert is one of a series of projects being carried out by the United Nations for the relief of 880,000 refugees who left Palestine four years ago.

Nfld. Plans To Launch Provincial Agricultural Survey

OTTAWA (CP)—The Newfoundland government plans to launch a provincial agricultural survey and the federal government is providing an expert for the job.

Agriculture Minister Gardiner disclosed that, in the Commons last week in reply to W. J. Browne (PC—St. John's West), who said something has to be done for Newfoundland's agriculture which has been suffering from neglect for many years.

Mr. Gardiner said he probably shouldn't be making the announcement, which should come from the provincial government. But he had noticed Premier Joseph Smallwood in the Commons' diplomatic gallery and he presumed it would be all right to do so.

Mr. Smallwood spent a short time in the gallery watching the Commons debate. He told a reporter earlier that he was here to represent Newfoundland in the appeal by eight provinces against last month's seven-per-cent freight-rate boost.

Gives Cost Of Army Clothing

OTTAWA (CP)—The government spent \$21,033,790 for 1,955,677 coats, caps and belts for the armed services in a 21-month period.

In a return filed last week in the Commons for F. E. Lennard (PC—Wentworth) the government said the sum was spent between April 1, 1951, and Dec. 31, 1952. The order included six types of caps or berets for men and women, rain and greatcoats and three kinds of belts.
