NOTES OF THE MARKETS.

Pork declined 30c. in Chicago on Wednesday. Corn declined 1/4 to 1c. Oats also declined, but wheat gained a fraction.

An active demand from foreign buyers for hams and bacon has caused an advance of 1/2c. per lb., live weight, for hogs in the west.

Cheese rules much the same as last week in Montreal, but the market is not as stiff as it was.

At Cornwall on Saturday cheese sold at 7 1/2 to 7 5/8-8c; at London 7 1/4; at Cowansville, Quebec, 7 1/8 to 7 2/16.

Oats are firmer in the west, owing to unfavorable crop reports from some Ontario districts.

A Winnipeg despatch of August 1st says: "Wheat is selling at Brandon at 74c at Fort William at 87c per bushel."

BACON IN P. E. ISLAND.

Charlottetown Has the Largest Pork Factory in Canada.

A Prince Edward Island correspondent of the Country Gentleman writes that the value of the exports of bacon from that province during the last six months amounts to more than \$300,000, and that it is expected that the sales of the next twelve months in Great Britain alone will exceed \$500,000.

A BOSTON ALCHEMIST.

He Claims to Know the Secret of Making Precious Stones.

BOSTON, Aug 3.—A Boston upholsterer has turned magician and says he knows how to make sapphires, rubies, &c., as good as those turned out by nature.

His name is Albert J. Ruby, who may have something to do with his penchant for precious stones. But so far as any one knows he has not produced any gems of the first water yet.

His own account of ruby and sapphire making is given in this brief and vague manner: "Last winter," says Mr. Ruby, "while looking for a solvent for carbon with the idea of separating the carbon afterward and reducing it to a soluble, hard and fusible form (by the way, I was trying to make a diamond), I accidentally and with the help of God discovered the secret of crystallization or the making of the alluminous precious stones, rubies, emeralds, &c."

And yet Mr. Ruby seems to possess other merits besides the ear-marks of a crank. He is a student. He reads many volumes in the public library which are not called for by other people.

"But," says Mr. Ruby, "I am far ahead of all other experimenters in this line. I possess the secret of crystallization, which is at the bottom of the whole thing."

"I will be the first man," he says, "and perhaps the last man, to make a perfect spinelle ruby, sapphire ruby and herl emerald. A person might spend fifty years with book learning, trying to find out how to make these precious stones, but except his mind is centred on one line of thought his time would be wasted."

"The line of thought which lead to success comes from God, and don't you forget it. With me it is only a question of a short time to a first class condition and have it pronounced a genuine stone in every way. At the start I propose to turn out turquoise without one grain of glass or silica in it, chrysolite and other opaque forms. They can be produced in squares, hearts, crosses, or in the shape of beads with holes in them; and they will be the fad for a generation to come."

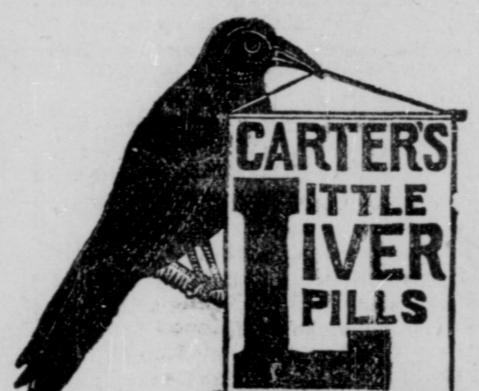
A WARNING.
