Coal Famine Threatens England.

LONDON, Jan. 3.—The United Kingdom is threatened with a coal famine. Unless the conditions improve many industrial concerns depending upon the coal supply may have to suspend before February, as their margin of profit is gradually being wiped out. Wages have gone up, but labor is hard to find. The normal Christmas congestion of traffic aggravates the situation, while the Government need of fuel for transports, war vessels, and depots on the way to the Cape have created unprecedented demand.

ASSAULT WITH INTENT.—Upon the strength of an information laid yesterday afternoon by Mary Jane O'Hanley a warrant has been issued for her husband, Angus O'Hanley, charging him with assault with intent. At latest accounts he had not been located by the police.

THE ROYAL BANK.—The Merchants' Bank of Halifax will make application to the next Parliament to have their Act of Incorporation amended by changing the name of this well known successful monetary institution to "The Royal Bank of Canada."

Four thousand dollars of the estate of Murdoch Gillis will be used to fund the "Murdoch Gillis Ward" in the Charlottetown Hospital. The deceased willed the bulk of his estate to charitable purposes.

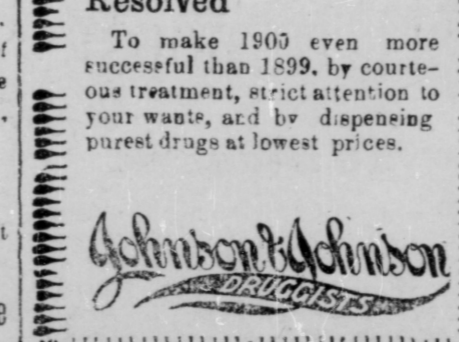
