TELEGRAPHIC NEWS.

SPECIAL DESPATCHES TO THE EXAMINER.

Strikes Prevalent.

LONDON, May 14. The strikes are prevailing throughout Germany like an insurrection. They break out in city after city in northern provinces and the number of trades affected is rapidly increasing. Even in Berlin, under the eyes of the Kaiser, labor is becoming insubordinate. The stoppage of the tramways are momentarily expected. Employers have been in consultation all night, and are making arrangements for a general strike if their demands are not complied with. So unusual and widespread is this uprising of labor, the government seems to be at a loss how to deal with it. It is averse to crushing it by military force, and continues to favor a policy of compromise between employers and employes.

Thunder and Lightning Storm.

LOCKPORT, N. S., May 14. This locality was visited by a terrific thunder and lightning storm this morning. Two houses were struck by lightning owned by Captain Colin McKay and Deane Lloyd. The former's house was considerably damaged, the electric fluid passing down the chimney shattering it and then going out the end of the house, tearing off the boards, shingles, etc. Lloyd's house was almost wrecked. The windows were broken, the floor torn up, the roof lifted and partly stripped off the boards. The shingles were broken up into match wood. Mrs. Lloyd, when the chimney fell into the room covering the floor and bed with bricks, was in her bed, but was not injured.

An Unlawful Act.

BOSTON, May 14. L. E. Clark, Superintendent of the Money Order Department in the Boston post office, and E. B. Palmer, a clerk in the same department, were arrested Saturday by Inspector J. T. Boynton, of the United States Secret Service Department, charged with unlawfully opening a package addressed to William J. Vickery, one of the Board of Civil Service Examiners, now holding examinations in this city.

Heavy Rain and Snow.

ST. PAUL, Minn., May 14. Specials from various points in Minnesota and Dakota give accounts of a heavy rain and snowfall to-day at Oriska, Dakota, and about four inches of snow fell during the morning and it rained during the rest of the day. At Millbank, Dak., it has been raining hard the past twelve hours, and is still at it. At Bismarck at 6 o'clock six inches of snow lay on the ground.

Against Salisbury.

LONDON, May 14. William O'Brien, M. P., has obtained a writ against Lord Salisbury on a charge of libel. In a recent speech at Waterford the premier accused O'Brien of advocating murder and robbing men by taking farms from which tenants were evicted. For this speech the action was brought.

Horrible Accident.

WINNIPEG, May 14. A horrible accident occurred at Rat Portage this morning—a German laborer named Traynor was instantly killed in a saw mill, by the saw breaking and cutting his head off.

The Compton Contest.

OTTAWA, May 14. A gentleman who returned to-day from Compton reports that the prospects of the Government candidate are excellent. The Grit-Prohibition compact is likely to prove as great a fizzle in Compton as in Cumberland and Shelburne.

OTTAWA, May 14. It is understood that the Premier denies that he has any present intention of visiting England this summer.
