Presbyterian Church Short Of Ministers

TORONTO, June 5 — (CP) — The Presbyterian Church in Canada is considering arrangements to bring clergy and students from Britain because of the large number of vacancies for ministers throughout Canada.

The scheme was discussed today at the 78th Presbyterian General Assembly. Action on the matter was deferred until reports from the committee on recruitment for the ministry and the stipends committee were presented.

Rev. G. Deane Johnston of Central Church, Brantford, Ont., chairman of the Mission Board, said there now are 70 vacancies in augmented and self-supporting charges and 50 in mission fields.

Mr. Johnston said that many letters had been received from British ministers and a list of from 40 to 50 ministers interested in coming to Canada had been prepared.

He said it appeared the only wise thing to do was to send two men to interview them and their families.

Rev. E. J. White of Edmonton questioned whether or not the scheme was worthy of the expense when the church could not afford adequate stipends.

Rev. Charles Poole of Baddeck and Middleton, N. S., recalling the coming of ministers with their flocks to Canada 125 years ago, said: "Let us beware lest we rob our brethren of their spiritual leaders."

The assembly also decided to accept the invitation of a joint committee representing five other church groups to share with them the development and production of a new Book of Praise.

Estimated cost of preparing the book for publication was \$50,000 with the Presbyterian Church in Canada paying \$4,500 as its share.

Moderator Elected

Dr. John Angus MacInnis, Minister of Central Presbyterian Church in Charlottetown, was elected Moderator last night.

Dr. MacInnis was born in 1886 at Mira, Cape Breton Island.

In 1915 he enlisted with the Canadian Army Medical Corps and served in France for three years. He was discharged in 1919 and obtained his Theology degree in 1921.

Appointed to the British Columbia coast district that year, he later became an assistant minister in Edmonton. He was awarded a travelling scholarship to Union Seminary, New York, where he received a Bachelor of Divinity degree in 1923.

P.E. Island Guernsey Prominent In R.O.P.

Island Guernseys are prominent among the outstanding animals listed in the current issue of the Canadian Guernsey Breeders' Journal. The journal covers the R.O.P. listings for the months of February and March and show that two Island cows topped their class in that period.

Brackley Budy topped the two-year old class on twice-a-day milking for owner Guy Rodd of Brackley in the 365-day division with 10,366 lbs. of milk and 580 lbs. fat. Evergreen Beatrice topped the mature class on twice-a-day milking in the 365-day division for Brenton Newson of Brackley with 13,192 lbs. of milk and 635 lbs. fat.

In addition Mr. Newson placed a cow on the Honor Roll in the three year old class. Rose Marie 4th turned in record of 10,622 lbs. milk and 586 of fat to place her eighth on the Honor Roll.

Patossie Rosie's Donna owned by Dan MacLean of Milton placed second in the four-year old class in February with 12,882 lbs. of milk, 660 of fat. Brackley Dolly's Maid qualified in the same class for Willard Proude of Kingston with 8,196 lbs of milk and 423 lbs. fat.

MacLean's Roma qualified in the three year old class for Dan MacLean who had 7,305 pounds of milk and 330 lbs of fat.

Guernhill Barbara Ann qualified for Willard Proude in the two year old class with 7,422 of milk and 441 of fat.

In the mature class for March a number of Island cows are listed. The names and records are as follows: Square Grove Mayflower, owned by Brenton Newson—9,410 lbs. milk, 554 lbs. of fat; Patossie Dairy Queen, owned by Daniel MacLean, 12,195 lbs of milk and 550 fat; Brackley Queen 2nd, owned by Guy Rodd, 11,279 lbs of milk and 548 of fat.

United Church Sessions Continue At Sackville

SACKVILLE, N. B., June 5 — (CP) — An urgent need for religious education of "Protestant minorities" exists in certain parts of the Maritime Provinces, the Maritime Conference of the United Church of Canada was told here today.

Rev. Edgar Baird, of the committee of Protestant-Roman Catholic relations introduced discussion of the religious education problem. Rev. D. H. Archibald, president of the Protestant Community Association of Edmundston, N. B., spoke on the acuteness of the problem in Edmundston.

The conference authorized the committee to take steps to deal with the situation, and invited other Protestant communities to appoint representatives to a joint committee to study the subject.

Today's sessions were taken up with reports of various phases of United Church activities in the Maritimes.

Fifteen new ministers from various parts of the Maritimes will be ordained Sunday. Today they were introduced to the conference. They are: George Edward Barrett, Sydney; David Harold Barwise, Charlottetown; Frederick Chester Burill, Yarmouth; Roshborough Brydson Hamilton, Halifax; James Herman Hicks, Amherst; Robert Herbert Hughes, Wallace, N. S.; Douglas Reid Jennings, Elmsdale, N. S.; Harold Alexander Kennedy, Port Hawkesbury; Angus John MacDonald, Boiestown, N. B.; Donald Carleton MacMahon, Halifax; Clifford Reagh Moose, Kenston, P. E. I.; Douglas Haig Ramsay, Florence, N. S.; Carl Raymond Riggs, North Sydney; Ralph Williams Rogers, St. Stephen; Rupert Chandler Usher, Martin, N. B.
