NOTES AND COMMENTS.

—Thousands of dollars of Canadian public money have lately gone into the pockets of New York contractors for Wagner cars,—though cars good enough for Canadians can be built by Canadian workmen.

—It was stated in Parliament a few days ago, and not denied, that Sir Wilfrid Laurier or the Government has sent a contribution of \$5,000 to aid in supporting the schools which the Manitoba Catholics have established since the separate schools were wiped out. We are told that Sir Wilfrid Laurier was pointedly asked whether or not this statement is true—and he remained silent.

—Sir Wilfrid Laurier, in 1896 denounced as "corrupt and indefensible the payment of lawyer's fees and costs for services which might be done by the Minister of Justice, the Solicitor General and his subordinates in office. But the lawyers' bills continue to enlarge. Here is the record:—

1897.....	101,409
1898.....	100,281

If the Conservative payments to lawyers were "corrupt and indefensible" what shall be said of those of the Liberals?

—Japan is a nation of gardeners. Stock raising, dairying, and production of such farm crops as wheat, corn and oats, are pursuits almost unknown to the Japanese. Rice, sweet potatoes and common garden vegetables are grown in abundance. All is done by hand labour. A recent traveller says:—"In travelling over the country for two weeks I did not see a single implement except that used by the hand. The ground is prepared by spading and digging with unwieldy tools, then pulverized and levelled by a heavy rake, put in excellent condition, and the cultivation is excellent. Not a weed is permitted to grow, and as soon as the crop is removed another is planted." The fields are small, but they are all gardens. A great population derives support, to a great extent, from gardening.

OBITUARY.

The people of Cape Traverse are once more called upon to mourn the loss of one of their most esteemed citizens and friends, in the person of Mrs. Joseph Clark, who, after a brief period of suffering from a gripe complicated with pleurisy, passed composed and resignedly to her rest on Sunday last. Mrs. Clark was in her 75th year and had lived in Cape Traverse for upwards of 40 years, deeply beloved and highly respected by all who had the happiness of her acquaintance. Mrs. Clark was a Baptist in religion, and a worthy member of her church. In her walk and conversation she exemplified the evidence of a sincere and humble Christian. During her life she was always industrious, cheerful and intelligent, hospitable to the needy as well as kind and comforting to the bereaved and sick. During her sickness she had the attention and consolation of all the surviving members of her family at her bed side of whom she leaves behind to mourn their loss an aged and devoted husband, two daughters, Mrs. John McFarlane, of Sea Cow Head, Mrs. Isaac Auld, of Boston, Mass., two sons, Thomas and John, both of Cape Traverse, also her only surviving brother, Mr. Thomas Beauty of Summerside. The funeral which was largely attended took place on Tuesday, conducted by the Rev. Mr. Palmer, of Bedouque. To the bereaved family and large circle of relatives the community extends their deepest sympathy.

The Canadian Oath

OTTAWA, April 12.—St. Joseph's parish branch of the Catholic Truth Society has appointed a sub-committee to interview Hon. Charles Fitzpatrick, Solicitor-General, and Hon. Canadian Trade.

NEW YORK, April 15.—R. G. Duo & company's weekly review of trade in the United States says: There is still increase in all legitimate business and the productive power of great industries increased even though some of the stocks decline. The sharp reaction in speculation a week ago in no way affected the producing capacity of furnaces or mills, and has been in part discovered, while the disturbance of business caused by the formation of great combinations has in a large measure ceased. It is not owing to speculation alone that payments through the chief clearing houses have been 80 per cent. larger than in the same week of 1892, and 103.3 per cent. larger than 1897. Failures for the week have been 188 in the United States, against 254 last year; and 22 in Canada, against 18 last year.

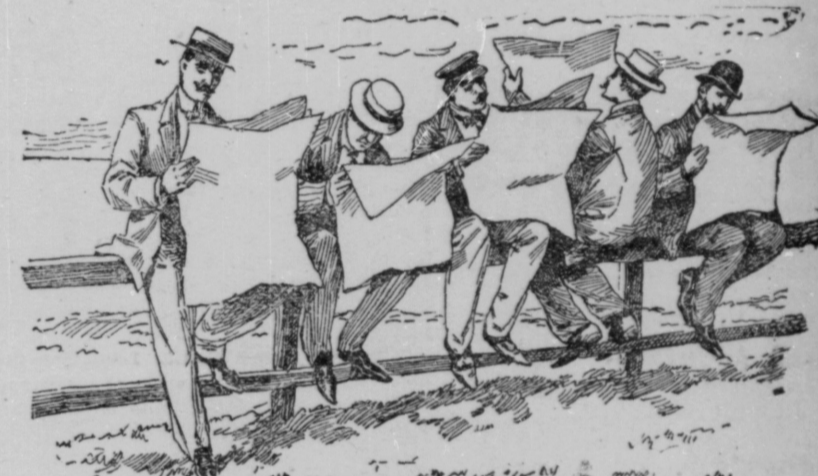

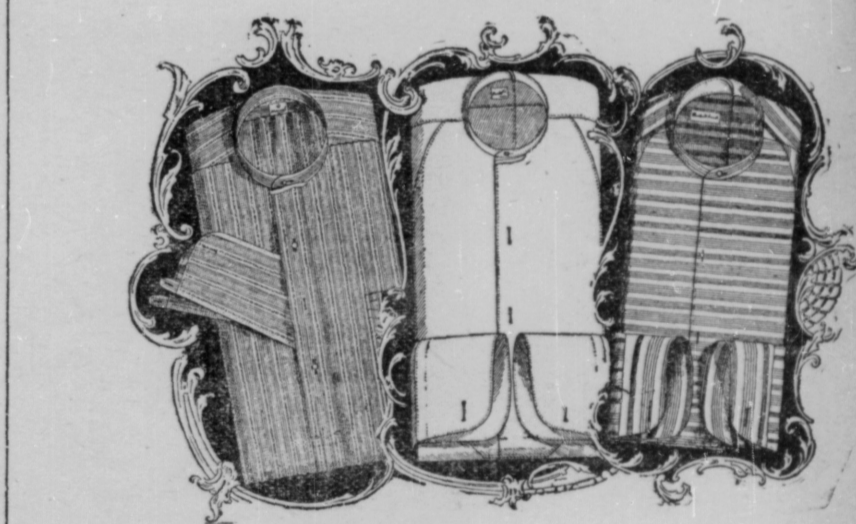
