

All Stars Win Island Candle Pin Ch'ship

Team captain Joey MacDonald led his All Stars to the Prince Edward Island Candle Pin championship yesterday at the Roll-Away Alleys after a bitter bowling battle with the Hot Shots in the Provincial tournament.

The All Stars and the Hot Shots ended regular tournament play in a tie, with each team having eight points. Four play-off games were required before the All Stars could prove their claim to the title.

In the first game of the play-off match the All Stars defeated the Hot Shots by one point. The Hot Shots won the second by 18 and the All Stars the third by another single point. As a result the match ended in a tie and a sudden-death game was required to decide the winner.

Russell Awarded Split Decision Over Flannagan

DARTMOUTH, N. S., June 9.—(CP)—Young Johnny Russell, Charlottetown, was awarded a split decision over Ace Flannagan, Dartmouth, in an eight-round main event of a boxing show here tonight.

Russell, weighing 166, held a six-pound advantage over the Dartmouth fighter and was awarded the decision by judges Jack DeLaney and Maurice McIntyre. Referee Clyde McGinnis scored it a draw.

Both mixed it up in a fast, crowd pleasing fight. Flannagan floored the Charlottetown fighter once in the second and twice in the fourth. In the fourth, however, he wrestled more than punched Russell to the canvas.

Flannagan was bleeding from the nose and a bad cut over his left eye at the end.

In the six round semi-final Frankie Garnier, Halifax, was awarded a fourth round technical knockout over Bob Leadley, Dartmouth.

Dick "Kid" Howard, Maritime lightweight champion, boxed a fast four round exhibition bout with Don Trainor, Charlottetown.

Views on How To Defeat Communism

ATLANTIC CITY, N. J., June 9.—(AP)—Pat Conroy, Canada's labor attaché in Washington, today said Communism can only be defeated if the free world produces a better social system—including a job for everyone.

Conroy said Communism "can only be defeated by us, as a people, producing a better social system that will make Communism as very little attraction to the average man or woman."

A job with a fair and decent wage is the "core of the life of the average human being," he stated in a talk to officials of the International Association of Public Employment Services.

Conroy spoke to about 75 association officers and state charter presidents at a meeting before opening the group's 39th annual convention tomorrow.

Amid charges and counter charges, the tossing of bricks at one another's heads and cries of "we wuz robbed," the baseball battle of the young 1952 season is expected to be waged at Memorial Field this evening with the Charlottetown Junior Abbies meeting the Maritime Central Airways nine. Game time is 8:30.

Probably not for quite a number of seasons have two teams gone into a league baseball game with as much desire to win as the Abbies and M. C. A. will carry into the battle this evening. Feeling between the managements of the two teams has been running high for the past five days and nothing would soothe those feelings like a victory tonight.

The famous "Chicken-Hawk" case of last week in which three Junior Abbies transferred their allegiance to the Maritime Central Airways has become a by-word for baseball talk in the City.

One of these "chickens," right-felder Elmer MacNeill, who has also been dubbed "A Mexican Jumping Bean," by his former team-mates, predicted freely Sunday night that M. C. A. would win by at least three runs.

Last night coach Ev. MacNeill of the Junior Abbies had a different opinion. "I think that we should be 2-1 odds to win this evening," he declared. Donnie MacLean will pitch for the Abbies with Forbes Kennedy doing the catching. Cliff Ready will play first, Joe Coyle in right field with either MacPadden or Ian Kennedy in left.

Either "Lefty" MacAleer or Freddy Kellor will start for M. C. A. Catching will be Arnold MacCallum while MacNeill will be playing right field and Lorne Hennessey at second.

Last night, Danny MacCormack, chairman of the Abegweit Baseball Committee quipped that it would be quite easy for an Abeg-

weil official to make a mistake this evening and land in the wrong dugout.

MacCormack also re-iterated his former charges about clubs raiding Abegweit teams. "When the league was formed M. C. A. said they did not intend to take any players who were on the City teams," he stated, "but look what they have done."

"The following morning they phoned me to discuss players who were on our team and who were not working. They said they needed a catcher, second baseman and right felder. That afternoon MacCallum, Lorne Hennessey and MacNeill went out there to work I still call it raiding," he concluded.

No Decision Made At MMHL Meeting Sunday

NEW GLASGOW, N. S., June 9.—The annual meeting of the Maritime Major Hockey League was adjourned Sunday until June 29. No decision was reached on the future of major hockey in the Maritimes.

Unofficially, however, the majority of delegates were of the opinion that a major series hockey league would operate next season on a "same" basis.

Prior to the next meeting, club owners will meet in New Glasgow for a round table discussion. Special attention will be given to the reduction of salaries and referees' fees and a shorter schedule.

Recommendations of the owners will then be brought before the general meeting.

Forrest E. Clow and Ralph Manning represented the Islanders at the meeting. Bill Brown, manager of the Charlottetown Forum was also in attendance.

Interviewed last night, Islanders executive member Mr. Clow stated that Halifax, Saint John and Charlottetown representatives advocating a new set-up, Glouce Bay and Moncton are interested in Maritime hockey next season while Sydney is definitely out as far as a six-team Major League circuit is concerned.

All six clubs will be returned the \$1,000 bond which they posted prior to the opening of last season. The Moncton bond was refunded after considerable discussion.

The payments of fines will also be returned to the clubs. This motion, moved by Mr. Clow and seconded by Mr. Roberts of Moncton, was strongly opposed by Sydney, but passed by a 5-3 vote.

More than \$28,000 was paid out by the league to referees in all thirteen regular officials were used.
