Persons to refuse to pay such demands. Some old people have peculiar views, you know. Is it quite nice and pretty to call these people Bolshevists for refusing to pay unlawful demands? May it not be that making such unlawful demands has caused a "slowing up" of tax collections? And if every man who cannot pay his taxes, or who hesitates to pay because he believes the demand to be unjust or extortionate, will it help matters to call him a Bolshevist?

Taxes are pretty heavy these days and "money is scarce," as the Premier says. All good citizens should and will pay all just and lawful tax demands. But after making every allowance for hasty speech and thoughtless word, we are forced to the conclusion that what Commissioner Lea, head of the Taxation Department, had to say about taking people "by the nose," and what our dear brother of The Patriot had to say about Bolshevistic journalism, had better not have been said or written. We think the offensive words should be recalled. We don't think they have really offended any Opposition writer. They have, no doubt, helped to increase the circulation of every Opposition newspaper. And they have made it harder to collect taxes.

If they will recall their hasty words and express regret for having uttered them, we shall be willing to drop the discussion of those items and sponge them off the slate. What could be fairer or more generous than that, dear Patriot? We are not of those who think a political opponent is altogether bad. We regard Premier Bell as somewhat of a philosopher and a good fisherman; Commissioner Lea is said to be a good farmer; the Attorney-General is no doubt learned in the law; the Commissioner of Public Works is respected as a man and the Honorable Editor of the Patriot is often quite amusing. But as a Government—well, perhaps it would be more kind and generous not to say today what we really think!
