Packed House Hears Soprano

(The following was written especially for the Guardian by the director of music for P.E.I.)

Continuing the weekly feast of music to which we are gradually becoming accustomed in Charlottetown (how did we ever do without for so long!) Lola Marshall sang by us last night in the Confederation Theatre. We had the pleasure of hearing a great soprano in the very person of her powers, her natural gifts seasoned by experience and not yet dulled by increasing years, and in excellent voice.

The house was packed, and the audience was enthusiastic. Miss Marshall gave of her very best unsparingly.

The first group of Elizabethan love songs was a delight to the ear. I did feel, however, that this wonderful voice was almost too big, too potent for these intimate songs. This may sound hypocritical, but there was so very little to criticize and so much to praise that the critic must work very hard indeed to find flaws unless his notice is to degenerate into a frank compliment.

The Schubert song cycle "Frauenlieb und leben" is well known to serious students of the German lied and its numbers have found their way into most of the usual vocal anthologies. Nevertheless the majority of the audience was, I imagine, unacquainted with this cycle, which was sung in German. Under such circumstances the audience should at least have been given the titles of the songs and a summary of their contents. I have a recording of this cycle made by the incomparable Kathleen Ferrier. The finest compliment I could pay Miss Marshall is to say that her interpretation almost measured up to that of Ferrier.

INWARDNESS
To sing Schumann the singer must have that quality that Schumann so often indicates in his scores — "Innigkeit", which may be translated into English as "inwardness". Without this quality this song cycle is not much more than an idyl of Victorian coziness; with it we are transported into a world of delicate rapture and sensibility. Miss Marshall gave every fleeting mood without overstatement.

It is noticed that she has acquired some darker tones in her palette of timbres. These were used to great effect in the final song in which the singer laments the untimely death of her beloved spouse. Mr. Kilburn managed the accompaniments very handsomely except perhaps in "Er, Der herrliche von Allen", where he was apt to hurry the tempo unduly. It is mooted that he is of Jewish descent, almost but not quite breathless.

First Dist. PC Association Elects Arsenault President

ALBERTON — William E. Arsenault of Caspucque was elected president of the First District Progressive Conservative Association at the annual meeting Friday evening in Alberton court house.
