## Student Nurse Is A Brisk 61

LONDON (CP)—It is never too late to do what you want to do, says 61-year-old student nurse, Mrs. Louisa Chandler, who won a gold medal for her final nursing examinations at a London hospital two years ago. Mrs. Chandler took up nursing at St. Francis's Hospital, East Dulwich, and became the oldest student nurse the hospital had ever had. Mostly looking after old people, Nurse Chandler says she feels she's doing a "really worthwhile job." She wanted to become a nurse in her youth, but her parents disapproved so she became a dressmaker instead. Infinite patience is needed for nursing, she explains, and making dresses for women "taught me patience." She is the first nurse to gain a gold medal at the hospital in nine years.

## Veteran Nurse Writes Memoirs

Canadian Press Staff Writer — EMERYVILLE, Ont. (CP) — Mrs. Mary E. Buck, the Canadian nurse who was the "guinea pig" in the X-ray machine in Michigan, is celebrating her diamond jubilee as a nurse.

Mrs. Buck, who turned 90 last February, has started to write of her adventures as a private nurse that took her through most of the midwestern United States and through three wars.

The slight, grey-haired native of Windsor, Ont., lives in a neat cottage in this lake St. Clair resort town 20 miles from Windsor WAR OF 1898.

A strong supporter of the Red Cross, she was with the unit during the First World War and as an executive officer in the Second. She served as a \$10 a week army nurse in the Spanish — American War.

Looking in the best of health and sporting a nice tan from working among her flowers, Mrs. Buck doesn't believe in being idle.

She admits having little interest in women her own age who "just sit around all day." All her friends are dead and she "stays pretty much" to herself.

Mrs. Buck did most of her travelling about the United States with her husband, Sanford, a bank executive Mr. Buck died several years ago and they had no children.

It was while in the small Michigan peninsula town of Gaylord that she started the first baby clinic in the state.

"They were just talking about it in Detroit while we had it done," EARLY DAYS TOUGH

Mrs. Buck said her retirement was gradual, but she readily recalled the day in June, 1897, she entered a training class at Harper Hospital in Detroit.

"You know nurses started much older in those days. The course was tough and 17 were in my class. We worked eight hours a day, seven days a week."

After her graduation Mrs. Buck remained at Harper as a floor supervisor.

It was while in the position that she "tried out" the X-ray machine.

"This telephone booth - looking object was wheeled in one day. It had a little stool inside. The doctors wanted somebody to try it out but nobody seemed to want it. I felt sorry for them, so I volunteered. My picture was frigh-

## Asks Women To Promote Safety

STE. ANNE DE BELLEVUE, Que. (CP) — The hand that rocks the cradle ought to do something about keeping automobiles rolling safely, a highway safety expert advised.

W. Arch Bryce, general manager of the Canadian Highway Safety Conference, told the annual convention of the Quebec Women's Institute it should do all possible to eliminate the four causes of motor accidents.

Mr. Bryce said they are improper attitude, lack of knowledge or skill, physical unsuitability and improper mechanical or physical environment.

Out of every 100 accidents, 85 were caused by human failure on the part of the driver or pedestrian, he said.

**STRONGEST INFLUENCE**  
"The influence of women is still the strongest influence in any man's life. I make the plea at this time that you as an organization make plans to exert all the power at your disposal upon these four accident causes to which I have referred."

He didn't put all the blame on motorists for accidents. Pedestrians too were guilty.

"All too often the careful instruction at school is nullified by the careless example set by parents when walking and shopping during the weekend," he said.

Mr. Bryce urged women's organizations to plan one kind of safety program such as pedestrian safety, bicycle safety, driver education and training, promotion of new traffic legislation an dthe like.

The conference was offering a \$1,000 award this year for competition among women's groups sponsoring the "most effective traffic safety program."
