Local and Other Items.

REGATTA PRIZE.—The Hon. E. J. Hodgson has presented a handsome silver challenge cup to be competed for yearly at the annual regatta held at Georgetown each summer open to the fishing boats of King's County. The regatta will this year be sailed some time next month.

A. parlors on Wednesday afternoon, 29th inst., at 4 o'clock at which the President will give a short account of the annual conference of the National Council of Women of Canada, held in Ottawa last month. ON A SURVEYING EXPEDITION.—The following paragraph we clip from an exchange: "Mr. Davies, a civil engineer and land surveyor, a nephew of Sir Louis Davies, left Ottawa for the Yukon district where he will be employed in making a survey with a view to railway facilities. Mr. Davies' work commences at a point 175 miles north of Genora, and will cover a stretch of two hundred miles, at which point another party starts surveying southward. Mr. Davies' party will consist of twenty hands, who will join him at Edmonton." The civil engineer and land surveyor above referred to is evidently Mr. F. D. C. Davies, of Charlottetown, who left for Ottawa some time ago. Mr. Davies is a cousin, not a nephew, of Sir Louis Davies.

Zola's Proposed Lecture Tour.
It is reported that M. Zola has agreed to come to the United States and deliver about 15 lectures, relating probably to anti-Semitism in France and to the trials of Dreyfus and himself. The arrangement is asserted to have been made with Mr. Edmund Gerson of New York and to have followed immediately upon the decision of the French government to grant M. Zola an appeal from the sentence of imprisonment lately pronounced upon him. An interesting detail of this report is that a sum approaching \$60,000 is promised to M. Zola for his visit. One could wish perhaps that that detail had been omitted. M. Zola would undoubtedly excite great interest here and would draw full houses, but he most interests Americans at present in his character, lately assumed, of patriot and protestant against prejudice and injustice, and interest based on grounds of that sort is hardly suitable for conversion into cash. It is possible, however, that his recent experiences have been costly, and that he has more than ordinary need of money.—Harper's Weekly.
