Value of Sea Products Landed Here Increases

The value of sea products landed by Island fishermen in 1962 was \$4,449,420, an increase of 6.8 per cent over 1961, Fisheries Minister Leo Rossier said yesterday.

Total weight of sea products landed was 54,975,974 pounds, a decrease from 1961 of 8.4 per cent. The 1962 total included 17,341,362 pounds of Irish moss.

Loabster poundage was down by 8.4 per cent last year with a catch of 8,711,912 pounds. Higher prices to fishermen in 1962 brought the value of the lobster catch to \$3,218,926, an increase in value over 1961 of 6.3 per cent.

Large gains were recorded in 1962 in cod fishing. Last year, the cod catch was 39 per cent higher than 1961 with a value of \$11,539, compared to \$24,133 the previous year.

The gyster catch was down last year by 25.6 per cent with 2,405,548 pounds bringing \$300,764. Also slipping, by 8.1 per cent in 1962, was Irish moss which had a value of \$288,106.

Subsidy Is Sought

Industry and Natural Resources Minister Leo Rossier is negotiating with the Maritime Transportation Commission on a federal subsidy for a shipping service between this province and Corner Brook, Nfld.

He also said that he is negotiating on renewal of the subsidy on shipping to the Sept Iles, Que. area. This subsidy amounts to \$85,000 per year, of which the provincial government pays half.

There is a subsidized service between the Island and St. John's, Nfld., at present and an additional subsidy will enable the service to be extended to Corner Brook.

Arthur MacRae has slightly under 12 months having been elected last April by acclamation following the resignation of Leo O'Meara.

SOURIS

In Souris it was firmly anticipated that all seats will be filled by acclamation. It was pointed out that in Souris civic elections requiring the voters to cast ballots are few and far between.

The last election in 1961, was reported to be the first time that the mayor and council had not gone in by acclamation in some 14 years.

Rumors last night indicated that the mayor, C. E. Lavie and all his councillors plan to reannunciate. But it was not known whether Mr. Lavie will be seeking another term as chief magistrate or merely as a councillor. Should he decide to go for councillor, the names of A. J. MacLean or Henry Larla have been mentioned to fill the mayor's chair.

The retiring councillors, who are expected to nominate again, are Andrew Meurant, John J. MacDonald, P. J. Doucette and L. MacDonald.

GEORGETOWN

As almost similar situation exists in Georgetown, where it is anticipated that retiring Mayor H. Stewart and his full council will be seeking another term. The present councillors are Dr. A. Kennedy, W. J. Fitzgerald, Patrick Murphy, J. P. Johnson, Guy Humphry and J. Spurgeon Walker.

In both Souris and Georgetown there have been no rumors that any dark horses might want to nominate.

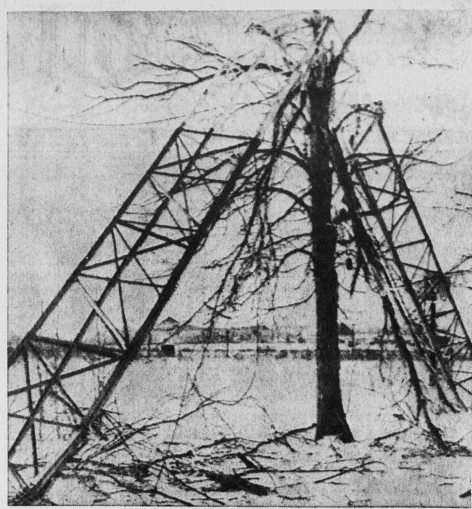

HALIFAX (CP) — The weather office says a high pressure area is expected to cross the Maritimes today giving a mainly sunny day to all regions. A few snowflurries can be expected along windward coasts and temperatures are forecast to be 10 to 15 degrees below seasonal normal.

Elite Potato Seed Farm Stated 'Bang Up Success'

The first year's operation on the elite potato seed farm was a "bang up success," said R. L. Burge, chairman of the provincial potato marketing board, which in quality and quantity, and the seed from an average 400-bushel yield per acre has been sold to growers in this province as had been intended," he said. There were 24 acres planted and

enough seed has been retained for next year's needs.

The potatoes graded out at 370 bushels of top quality seed per acre with only 20 bushels of culls, and the grading standard was set higher than that used normally, he explained. Grading was under the supervision of federal inspector, Alton Rayner, O'Leary.

The farm produced Sebagoes, Kennebecs, Hunters and Cobb-

lers last year and consideration is now being given to the varieties that may be added this year. Several new ones may be planted, he explained.

The Hunter is a new variety which has been showing promise, although top potato men agree that it is still too early to give it unqualified approval.

Harold Pinner stated they are on Fox Island in Prince County, is almost completely surrounded by salt water as it is on a peninsula, and is therefore isolated from many of the land-borne pests or weeds.

Agriculture Minister Andrew MacLeur stated there will be enough clear, clean seed from the farm in five years time to supply growers' needs in the province. P.E.I. potatoes command a big premium on Toronto and Ottawa markets now, and Mr. MacRae believes the province can produce spuds that may command an even bigger premium if the full potential of the present program is realized.

Each County Is Designated For Resources Development

Federal Agricultural Rehabilitation and Development Act officials have decided that each county of the province will be designated as a separate resource development area. Industry and Natural Resources Minister Leo Rossier said yesterday.

"This will mean," he said, "that development officials will be set up in Kings and Prince Counties. There is already an office in Queen's County."

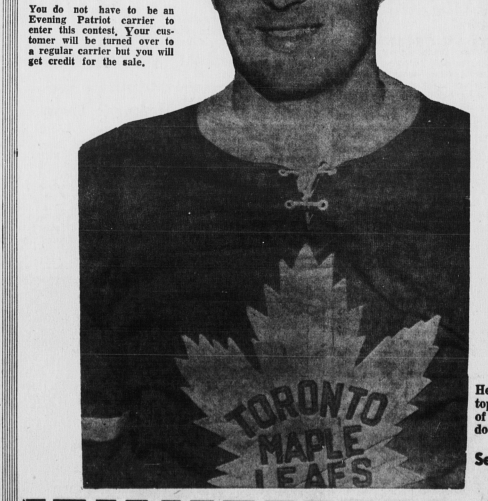
