KLONDIKE AND YUKON OUTPUT

It Amounts to Eleven Millions.

FRESH GOLD FINDS IN AMERICAN TERRITORY.

Activity at Quartz Creek and Koyukuk River.

SEATTLE, Wash., Sept. 21.—The first authentic and reliable statement of the output of gold from the Klondike and Yukon mines is made today by F. A. Wing, assayer in charge of the United States Assay Office here. Following are his figures: Amount handled by Seattle Assay Office, \$3,500,000; stored in Seattle banks and safety vaults, \$500,000; shipped away by express companies \$500,000; received at San Francisco, \$2,500,000; en route via the upper Yukon, \$2,000,000; en route via lower Yukon, \$2,000,000 making a total of \$11,000,000. These figures, the assayer stated, were conservative. Dust now en route is expected within the next two weeks.

The steamer City of Seattle arrived from Skagway this evening bringing 200 passengers and \$110,000 in gold dust from Dawson. Her dates are to Sept 1. Fearful ravages of typhoid fever are reported in Dawson ten to twelve deaths daily occurring from this disease.

Quartz Creek is now the scene of the greatest excitement, gold being discovered in large quantities on benches and high ground. The miners are organizing to protest against extortion by Canadian officials, and great trouble is anticipated.

Koyukuk River is now the scene of the greatest activity, thirty-two river steamers having penetrated the country for a distance of 600 miles within the past six weeks carrying thousands of miners and prospectors. New discoveries are occurring daily, and the reports are very encouraging. This is in American territory.

ARE DYING LIKE FLIES.

Pitiable Condition of the Cuban Insurgents.

THE ISLAND'S LAST STATE WORSE THAN THE FIRST.

Evident Effort to Conceal the Real Condition of Affairs.

LONDON, Sept. 21.—The Times this morning, publishes a letter from an Havana correspondent in which the writer points out that though, as in the Mother Country, there appears no disposition among the Spaniards in Cuba to attempt a pronunciamiento, the soldiers and civilians alike having accepted the disaster and its consequences, with a dreary fatalistic calm, the island is fast drifting into a condition of anarchy.

Insurgent bands, the correspondent says, are enjoying immunity in the commission of outrages and plundering; and this is especially true in the western provinces, where the insurgents bitterly complain that they have been ignored and abandoned by the United States and being utterly destitute, can only save themselves from starvation by rapine.

Without food, medicine and clothing they are dying like flies and unfortunately it is the best element among the insurgents that are suffering most severely. The Times, in an editorial article, draws attention to these difficulties facing the Washington Government and to the advisability that the peace conference be not unduly protracted.

The correspondent relates terrible stories of anarchy and says the American Government is apparently attempting to suppress the truth. As an instance, he gives the following story which he declares was suppressed by the censor at Key West:

A band of insurgents attacked recently the Providencia sugar factory, near Quines, one of the richest in Cuba. The guerrilla force, which the proprietor maintained to defend his property until the arrival of the Spanish troops, was obliged to surrender because the Spanish troops are now doing nothing to suppress lawlessness.

The insurgents invaded the enclosures where they found a lot of reconcentrados. They stripped the women naked and placing them in line fired from behind them at the guerrillas, thus making it impossible for the defenders of the factory to return the fire.

The correspondent declares that the most terrible and irremediable effect of the prolonged civil war in the island is the almost total destruction of the white population, which has left Cuba almost as black as Hayti.

MONCTONIAN KILLED IN BATTLE.
