TELEGRAPHIC NEWS.

[SPECIAL DESPATCHES TO THE EXAMINER.] The Scott Act Defeated in One County, and Sustained in Three.

OTTAWA, Oct. 30. Contests were held on the submission of the Canada Temperance Act in four Ontario counties to-day. In the small barley-growing county of Prince Edward the Act was defeated by 126 majority, with four places to be held from. In Bruce County the Act is adopted by 800 majority.

The Tiebborne Claimant. LONDON, Oct. 30. The first of a series of meetings in behalf of the Tiebborne claimant, was held last night at St. James' Hall. The claimant was accompanied by his son upon the platform and delivered an address to a large and enthusiastic meeting.

An Increase in Socialism. BERLIN, Oct. 30. A feature of the elections in Germany has been the enormous increase in the social Democratic vote in Berlin and other cities. The strength of that party in the next German Parliament will probably be double that in the last Parliament.

Spanish Troubles. MADRID, Oct. 30. Considerable uneasiness is manifested in Government circles owing to the reports being current that Ruiz Zorrilla, revolutionist, is hiding on the French frontier, where he is tampering with Spanish troops of the northern provinces.

The British West Indies. LONDON, Oct. 30. The Daily News is informed that preliminary negotiations are proceeding between England and America, with a view to establish improved commercial relations between America and the British West India colonies.

Scott Act sustained. FREDERICTON, Oct. 30. The returns from the election in York County, to-day, for the repeal of the Scott Act, shows a majority of 126 against the repeal. A light vote was polled.

An Election Contest. OTTAWA, Oct. 31. The Dominion Election for Bruce County takes place to-morrow. The Government candidate is almost sure to be elected, as it has usually given 1,200 majority for the Government.

Gordon Reported a Prisoner. ALEXANDRIA, Oct. 30. Rumors come in to the effect that Khar-toum has fallen and General Gordon is Mahdi's prisoner. It is utterly untrue.

Cattle Thieves Lynched. DENVER, Col. Oct. 30. It is reported that 17 cattle thieves were captured by vigilantes on Gore Mountains, and lynched.

Wages Reduced. DUNDEE, Oct. 30. The mill owners have reduced the wages of operatives five per cent.

Mr. Schreiber Coming. OTTAWA, Oct. 30. Collingwood Schreiber has left for Prince Edward Island.

Killed in Acadia Mines.

SIX MINERS HURLED TO THE BOTTOM OF A SHAFT AT THE STEEL WORKS.

A special despatch of the 29th, from Acadia mines report that about one o'clock on the afternoon of the 29th, a terrible accident occurred at the west mines of the Steel Company of Canada. A cage was proceeding down the Dufferin shaft containing six men, namely:—Richard H. Perry, Thomas Vipend, Nathaniel Rushton, Oliver Rushton, Daniel Chisholm and John McInnis. While on the way, some of the gear attached to the cage suddenly broke and, rendered beyond control by the accident, it rushed toward the bottom with fearful velocity.

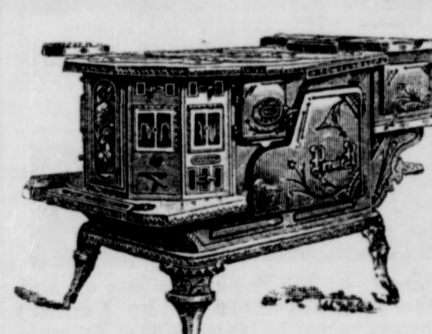
