

TELEGRAPHIC NEWS.

The Rhine Rising.

COLOGNE, Dec. 29. The Rhine and its tributaries continue rising. The bridge near Torrach, Baden, was destroyed last night by the flood and twenty people were drowned.

Sir Hugh Allan's Will.

MONTREAL, Dec. 29. The will of the late Sir Hugh Allan leaves property estimated at six million dollars.

Steamer Lost with All Hands.

SYDNEY, N. S. W., Dec. 29. The steamer "New England," 291 tons, Captain J. Craig, built at Glasgow, by T. Wingate & Co., and owned by the Richmond River Steam Navigation Company, of Sydney, was wrecked on the Clarence River, New South Wales, on the 28th inst. The passengers and crew were all lost.

France and Tonquin.

PARIS, Dec. 29. The Cabinet having decided that an expedition to Tonquin is necessary, President Grevy, on the 23rd, gave his assent to the proposal of Admiral Jaureguiberry, Minister of Marine, for a larger credit and more men. The credit demanded is 11,000,000 francs. Yesterday a transport sailed from Toulon for Tonquin with reinforcements. [The object of the expedition of France to the Chinese Seas is the annexation of Annam with Tonquin. It is believed that the French will be successful. A writer in the New York Herald says: "Unless the Chinese move from the north, or Thesabaw makes a diversion from Burmah, the unfortunate King Tuduk, ruler of Annam, will see the entire country wrested from him as summarily as he lost Tonquin."]

GENERAL CABLE NEWS.

SUEZ, Dec. 27. Arabi and his fellow exiles embarked this afternoon for Ceylon.

LONDON, Dec. 27. The News' correspondent telegraphs that the greatest distress prevails in Donegal.

VIENNA, Dec. 27. Reports from all parts of the Empire show that the six hundredth anniversary of the House of Hapsburg is being celebrated with the greatest enthusiasm.

LONDON, Dec. 27. Coleraine, Ireland, reports that the wife of Sir Francis Edmund Workman McNaughton has eloped with a young man—an agent for the Macartney estate. Lady McNaughton has several children. She is a daughter of William Howell Russell, L. L. D., the well-known newspaper correspondent.

CORK, Dec. 27. The Right Hon. William Johnson, Attorney-General for Ireland, and member of Parliament for Malloy, has accepted a vacant Judgeship in the Queen's Bench division of Her Majesty's High Court of Justice in Ireland, and Rev. Mr. Horton, Solicitor General, and John Nash, Law Adviser to the Crown, will become Solicitor General. Nash will be a candidate for the seat in the Commons made vacant by Johnson's acceptance of the Judgeship.

WASHINGTON, Dec. 27. The Senate to-day passed the Pendleton Civil Service Bill.

CITY OF MEXICO, Dec. 27. A treaty defining the boundary between Mexico and Guatemala has been approved by the Guatemala Assembly.

CAIRO, Dec. 27. Arabi, Toulba, and the other prisoners condemned to exile in Ceylon, were accompanied to Suez by Mark Napier one of the counsel who defended them.

BERLIN, Dec. 27. The Government are considering a proposal to raise a license tax on the manufacture of tobacco, so as to produce a revenue of 93,500,000 marks.

PARIS, Dec. 27. M. Dechard and Second in a duel of the former with M. Massas, editor of Petite Corporal, have been acquitted by law court of blame for the killing of Massas.

ST. LOUIS, Dec. 27. In the Indian Territory, near Ombulkee, on Sunday, a fight occurred between two bands of Indians, in which four were killed on one side; 13 on the other side is unknown. The United States troops arrived later and disarmed the belligerents.

CAIRO, Dec. 27. The Monitor Egyptian, to-day publishes decrees concerning other rebel prisoners. Emir Bey, El Shensy and eleven others will be placed under surveillance for various terms of years during which time they are forbidden to quit their estates. They are to be placed under heavy bail for the faithful observance of this injunction. Hassan Mousa, El Akid and Ali Roubi are to be banished to Massowah for twelve years. Three others will be banished to Suakinor Kasser for shorter terms, and twenty others, including Kadir Kadr and Rifat Bey, will be banished for various terms of years.

TORONTO, Dec. 29—10 a. m. Moderate winds; fair weather; not much change in temperature.

Foreign News.

It is reported that Russia has a force of eighteen thousand horsemen and ninety guns on the Austro-German frontier.

Serious difficulties have arisen between England and Russia consequent upon the latter Power discriminating against English and Indian merchants in their trade policy in Russian Turkestan, practically closing the markets of that rich district to British commerce. Lord Granville has insisted that the existing commercial treaties between Russia and England apply to the whole of the Russian Empire equally upon the banks of the Oxus with the banks of the Neva. The result of the negotiations at present proceeding will be awaited with anxiety.

When the late Lord Beaconsfield purchased \$20,000,000 worth of Suez canal shares he not only showed his wisdom as a statesman, but did a good stroke of business. The British shares are now valued at \$65,000,000, and the French Economiste points out that if the income of the canal continue to increase in a ratio equal to the past, in 1895 the British Government will receive a dividend amounting to about \$8,250,000, while the market value of the shares will not be less than \$200,000,000, or ten times the value of the original cost.
