

### St. Laurent Comments On European Trade Scheme

Ottawa (CP)—Prime Minister St. Laurent has suggested Britain and Western Europe reduce barriers on goods from Canada and other countries while planning reductions for their own mutual benefit.

The scheme envisaged by Britain and her proposed European partners of exchanging tariff cuts to create for themselves a free-flowing mass market has merit, providing it doesn't turn into a plan to exclude goods from other countries, Mr. St. Laurent said in a statement issued here Tuesday night.

The proposal, on which Britain asked Commonwealth countries or their common last month, would link up the United Kingdom with six European countries in a revolutionary free trade area where tariffs are reduced gradually on a pre-arranged basis.

The initial reaction here last month was that the scheme, while encouraging in its concept, would impose too heavy a burden on some national policies and would corrode into a trade block discriminating against non-European goods.

**GIVEN BROAD STUDY**

The Canadian government, however, decided to give the plan thorough study before making an official reply. Authorities said the Canadian view conveyed to the U.K. government is along the lines of Mr. St. Laurent's statement.

Britain has proposed that food, feeds, beverages and tobacco be excluded from the plan, but even so, said Mr. St. Laurent, the proposal would present "a number of problems for Canadian trade with the countries concerned."

These problems will be taken up for thorough discussions with the various European governments, he added.

The European free trade area, he continued, could, if successful, increase the economic strength and solidarity of free Europe and to this extent Canada would welcome it.

But Mr. St. Laurent felt it would have its most beneficial effects if it were linked with an expansion of European trade with other countries.

**NOTES EUROPE PLEDGE**

Europe had pledged to reduce trade barriers. If it did so, then it should be possible to surmount other difficulties the new trade plan may bring.

On the other hand, a partial development that resulted only in the creation of a new system of intra-European tariff preferences would interfere with trade between Europe and other countries, including Canada, without achieving the positive results which are expected from a full implementing of the plan," he said.
