

Queen's Own Rifles Leave Halifax To Return Home

HALIFAX (CP)—Amid the exciting blare of brass bands and shouted good-byes, soldiers of the 1st Battalion Queen's Own Rifles began leaving this port city Thursday for their homes across Canada.

Christmas leave before returning to their base in Calgary.

The last of three special troop trains was expected to leave Thursday at midnight carrying members of the battalion which had expected to be part of Canada's contribution to the United Nations police force in the Middle East.

The first train, scheduled to leave at 2 p.m., was delayed several hours as CNR agents distributed tickets. The army said normally only a government transport warrant is needed but the CNR requested tickets this time since the men are going to various destinations.

As the QORs crowded into their special trains, sailors of the aircraft carrier *Magnificent* descended in mass on Union Station here to board trains for their homes.

TRAVEL WITH SAILORS
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As the colonel strode along the platform, a young rifleman saluted respectfully, looked at the girl beside him and said, "may I kiss her merry Christmas, sir?"

"Proceed," replied the colonel. "Glad to be going home," was Pie, John Beyko of Yorkton, Sask., a married man of two years with a one-year-old son.

One soldier wondered what to do for transportation when he arrives home. When called away he said he sold a 1951 automobile for \$20 for quick sale.

Another looked at the words "Portage la Prairie" painted on the side of a railway car and shouted: "Portage la Prairie, that's close enough to home for me."

The troops were marched onto the trains by the Black Watch highland band.

Inquest Held At S'ide In Twin Fatality At New Annan

A total of nine witnesses were called at a coroner's inquest last night in Summerside in regard to the deaths of Robert Francis Watson of Summerside, and Donald Ralph Hately of Kensington, who were killed in a car accident at New Annan last Saturday night, November 3rd.

The inquest was conducted by Coroner Dr. W.E. Callaghan, with Dr. D.O. Stewart, Q.C., representing the Crown.

The first witness, Mary MacQuaid, R.N., of Kensington en route home from work at Prince County Hospital on the night of the accident, told of being stopped by two boys on the highway who told her they had a car and that moments later they had heard the screech of tires a car followed by the sound of a crash further along the road, and they wanted a drive back to investigate the incident. On arrival at the scene she had examined one of the injured without finding any sign of life, and she had tried without success to free Richard Hately who was pinned beneath the car, before she went to phone from a nearby home for a doctor, ambulance, and police.

Dr. J.K. Zielinski of Kensington told of being called to the scene of the accident where two men failed to reveal any sign of life. Richard Hately was suffering from a shoulder pain and from shock.

Dunstan Dalton, although excited and with a stammer, indicated a desire to stay at the scene until the RCMP arrived, and the witness had then left for hospital in Summerside with Hately, while Dalton was a brought along to hospital a little later by the police.
