### Grain

WINNIPEG, Sept. 14 — (CP) — All grain prices showed a firm tone today on the Winnipeg Grain Exchange, with flax taking the lead with wide gains.

Advances in flax were prompted by advances in United States flax, which brought out seaboard buying here. Oats and barley moved up under slipper demand. Export buying also was noted in barley. American interests were picking up rye. Hedging sales in all grains were mostly in the December contracts. Some of the buying was stimulated by forecasts of frost for some areas across the prairies tonight. Export loadings of Canadian wheat included 1,200,000 bushels for the United Kingdom and 370,000 for the Netherlands. Class two wheat and I.W.A. prices were up one-eighth cent in all but No. 4 Northerns, which were down seven-eighths.

Frederick Rowland, who would at the end of twelve months have been too old for the position; then in 1850 he was elected Lord Mayor, his name was read out in the Guildhall and the Livery responded with cries of "All".

#### Created A Baronet

As Lord Mayor Sir Denys Lowson—he was created a Baronet in the birthday honours of 1951—has received Queen Juliana and Prince Bernhard of the Netherlands, the King and Queen of Denmark, and King Haakon of Norway when they paid ceremonial visits to the City of London. He took part officially in the inauguration of the Festival of Britain and other Festival ceremonies—a picturesque occasion was when he opened the Festival river services, the first time a Lord Mayor had gone by state procession down the river for many years. With a fleet of boats rowed by Doggett's Coat and Badge men in their scarlet liveries, he proceeded down the Thames from London Bridge to Westminster, to the strains of Handel's Water Music played by an orchestra on one of the barges.

Apart from his business and civic life, Sir Denys Lowson is keenly interested in hospital work, has served as an official on the Boards of many voluntary hospitals, and was appointed to the Board of St. Bartholomew's under the National Health Act of 1948. He has also worked for the League of Mercy and the Order of St. John of Jerusalem, of which he is a Commander and a former Vice-President. In succession to his father he is a life Governor of the University College of Dundee and of the Shakespeare Memorial Theatre (where he is a member of the Executive Council) and is a member of the Royal Company of Archers.

#### A Great Traveller

Sir Denys has travelled widely, knows many parts of Africa, and as quite a young man made a practice of crossing the Atlantic frequently. "I like to study American investments on the spot," he would say. "You can learn so much from personal contacts, and the Americans are full of financial ideas." He also knows Canada well from many visits. Apart from travel, and philately, which is another of his recreations, he is a crack rifle shot who as an undergraduate represented his University.

Sir Denys Lowson married, in 1936, the Hon. Patricia Macpherson, younger daughter of the first Lord Strathcarron, who as Sir Ian Macpherson was M.P. for Ross and Cromarty and a one-time Minister of the Crown. They have two daughters and a son, Gay, Melanie and Ian. Lady Lowson is a keen gardener and has a flair for interior decoration; in the early days of her marriage she successfully modernised her home on Campden Hill in a striking and attractive manner. Later the family moved to their present home in Sussex.

Director addressed the meeting and complimented the members of the League on the good work accomplished and asked them to continue. The meeting closed with prayer.

### Let's Talk It Over

A Prince County Viewpoint by "d"

Getting modern up-to-date equipment for schools is important, of course, but not so important as obtaining modern, up-to-date teachers. Put a poor teacher in a classroom with all the best facilities for teaching and you cannot expect anything but mediocre results.

On the other hand, a teacher with the right kind of experience and advanced methods of teaching can get gratifying results in a washed made over into a makeshift classroom. Nothing can take the place of the personality of the teacher in educating children.

Because of this, the first duty of a progressive school board is to see that the teachers are the best that can be obtained, and to treat these teachers with the consideration due them. If the stress is laid on material rather than on the teaching personnel you may end up with a very beautiful building and little else.

Shapiro's article in the latest issue of MacLean's magazine should be read by everyone. It tells of the two wars that we may have to fight with Russia: the military war, which may be avoided, and the psychologic-economic war which we are fighting now and must continue to fight in the future.

In Europe it is little use to talk of democracy and freedom to people who are fighting such a grim, unrelenting battle to survive. Inflation and its evils as they exist in Europe are the most potent weapons communism has today in its fight against a free world. In spite of the fact that communistic tactics in China and elsewhere have shocked the world, communism has held its own in France and gains in Italy.

We in Canada are much ahead of those in France and Italy, of course. But even here inflation has raised its ugly head. We have a long way to travel to arrive at the desperate plight where we will be ready to accept communism instead of a wretched lot. But we are on that road and facing that direction. That is a sobering thought. If the inflationary spiral continues to rise, the time will inevitably come when our free way of life will not be so important to us as a square meal. Then the ground will be prepared for the entrance of Communism. Let us hope that this haven of liberty never drops to that level.
