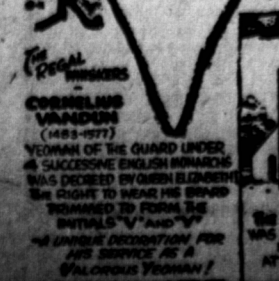

Roy Crabtree, general chairman of the conference and president of the Primary Textile Institute, says: "The intention is to attract attendance by all parts of the Canadian textile industry—Canada's third largest employer of manufacturing labor, with 82,000 employees. "In the past there have been large meetings of technical groups and industry groups, but the conference will include a place for every branch of the industry. "The program will include the full range of industry business and technical developments to fashion shows. "Sir Saville Garner, United Kingdom high commissioner, said in an address to the Canadian Manufacturers' Association last week: "Competition is not the enemy—poverty is the enemy. "He was referring to fears concerning proposals for a European common market and a European free trade area. "If Western Europe can expand and progress," Sir Saville said, "she will make greater demands from the production of trading countries overseas. "Britain could not join the six-countries common market area, because this would have adversely affected her Commonwealth trading relations. However, she had proposed the larger industrial free trade area. This would accord free entry to goods from the European members of the area, but it would leave her free to impose tariff on the outside world and, in this way safeguard the position of Commonwealth partners. "There had been worries that the six-countries common market might become inward-looking, but the best guarantee that it would develop on broad lines as a low-tariff, non-discriminatory community lay in its association with the free trade area of which Britain would be a part. "Inevitably there would be hard-ship. It would cause some transference of effort in Europe. Some firms, and perhaps some industries, in Britain, would be hard hit and might go under. But it would be a long time—15 years—before the arrangements were complete, so there should be plenty of time for adjustments. "The six countries of the proposed common market area are Belgium, France, Germany, Holland, Italy and Luxembourg. "It has to be increased for two reasons—yours and ours. This makes kidnapping a capital offense if the person abducted suffers bodily harm. "Chessa was also convicted of attempted rape, sex perversion, robbery, automobile theft, and other crimes.
